# Photographic Musings with Photobakobob

## **Photographic Merit**

Most of us have wandered around, looking for that great image.

Keeping the mechanics in mind helps, but only to a limited extent. Let's see now. Decide on my subject and/or the story I want to tell. *Check.* Simplify (easier said than done). *Check.* Compose in order draw attention to main the subject and to maximize esthetic impact. *Check.* Deal with lighting as possible, and if outdoors, pick the best time of day. *Check.* Adjust exposure, focus, depth of field, and other technical stuff as required. *Check.* Use tripod if indicated. *Check.* ---- We all try do those things and others, but do we usually – or even often - get the result



we are hoping for? For me, not often enough. Yes, I mostly can make well composed, reasonably sharp, and properly exposed images, and there are some, a subset, that I might call "art," although some might disagree.



Here's how I got thinking about all this. A few weeks ago, a member of the club suggested a field trip to Griffith Observatory to observe the lights of Los Angeles and, of course, make some images of said lights. That reminded me of a famous image of those same lights by the German photographer Andreas Gursky. That photograph, made in 1998, sold at auction in 2011 for \$2.9 million. It can be seen here: <u>http://www.artnet.com/artists/andreas-gursky/los-angeles-czm8hO5AFGfc31oBIVnnCg2</u>. It is a nice shot, certainly, and was rendered as a large Cibachrome print, 62x124.7 in., but beyond that, what exactly makes it better, or more compelling as an image than many of the merit winners

we see each month at our club? I don't know, but clearly someone thinks that particular combination of image and presentation was indeed worth a lot more – as an investment, as art, or both. Gursky is a fine photographer, and I don't mean to imply otherwise. I am using his work as an example to illustrate the difficulty at least I have in finding a way to objectively determine the merits of photographic art. The answer, I believe, lies with the photographer's purpose as well as the perceptions and expectations of the viewer. It is clear that in the case of Gursky's work, both have been realized, presumably well enough to satisfy both the photographer and his clients.

I have concluded, then, that as photographers, each of us should define our own purpose. I'll use the term "vision."

Alain Briot recently wrote an article about his vision. In it, he expressed it as follows:

*My vision is one of beauty. When I create landscape photographs my goal is to express the beauty I see and feel in nature and specifically in the landscape. For me the experience of*

walking in a beautiful landscape is comparable to the experience of walking into a painting. Everything is beautiful. Everything is in harmony. I see it and I feel it. The light, the colors, the forms and all the other elements combine to create an experience where beauty dominates. It is this experience that I seek to restitute, to recreate, in my images.

Your vision may not be the same as his, and it may not be expressed as explicitly, either. But you should have one.

My vision is to create photographs that are interesting and engaging, and that have impact on the viewer. This could include anything from landscapes to photojournalism to abstracts. When people ask me what kind of photography I do, I reply "Anything that interests me."

Three of my images accompany this article. They were taken at Lake Ming, a small lake near my house in Bakersfield; Marshall Point Light in Maine; and Dead Horse Point overlooking the Colorado River near Moab, Utah. I chose them only because I like them.

I attempt to judge the success of my images by the extent to which they accomplish my vision.



I will fall short some – even most – of the time, but those images that come close to meeting my vision, even though imperfect, will make it all worth it. I don't think anyone will be offering me \$2.9 million for any of my photos in the near future, but an occasional "nice shot" would be OK.

# Exploring *Digital* Photography with Photonaut

## "Lightroom"

I have heard for many years that surveys show that professional photographers use Lightroom more than Photoshop. There is a good reason for that, Lightroom was specifically designed as a product for photographers. Its layout mimics the work flow that photographers used for many decades back in the days of film, and it has an excellent cataloging system. It was designed to streamline and hide the fussy computer like interface and processes that typical computer applications provide.

However, since I learned to use Photoshop many years before I ever saw Lightroom, I prefer to use Photoshop for most digital image processing work, maybe as much as 90% of the time. Why? **Because I am used to it**, also there are many things you can do to an image in Photoshop that Lightroom cannot do. There are a *few* things you can do in Lightroom that you cannot do (or cannot easily do) in Photoshop. Adobe has gradually increased the image processing functions that Lightroom can perform with each new release, and it is getting very close to being as capable as Photoshop.

So, since I only use Lightroom occasionally, I am not by any means an expert in it. To see if I was missing anything important, I recently completed a thick book by Adobe Press called "The Adobe Photoshop Lightroom 5 Book" by Martin Evening. This is a comprehensive guide on how to use Lightroom 5. I found out I was already familiar with most of what is in that book, but there were a few surprises to me, mostly some changes in Lightroom 5 that work differently or are new features compared to what was in Lightroom 3, my previous version.

One very basic thing I learned that was not obvious (to me!) is that the tools in the Lightroom 5 develop module were specifically redesigned to be worked from *top to bottom, in that order,* to quickly obtain the best image results. Don't start with the tools in the middle of the panel and work up. These tools (Exposure, Contrast, Highlights, Shadows, etc) overlap in their effects upon the image, so using them in the order as the designers intended is helpful. The Exposure tool in Lightroom 3 was basically "hands off", using it often caused hard clipping. The Exposure tool in Lightroom 5 (and 4) is a joy, it is the very first thing you should adjust. Not only does it adjust the image differently than before, it has been reprogrammed to avoid clipping, or only soft clip if totally unavoidable.

There are two new clever features in Lightroom 5 that I find extremely interesting. They are not in Photoshop. One is the Radial Filter Tool. The Radial Filter is like Photoshop's Adjustment Brush that can be dragged around to quickly lighten specific areas, increase color saturation, etc, but it works in an incredibly smooth and subtle way. Need to lighten a dark face? Piece of cake. Need to only make the yellow flowers in a bush more yellow? Easy. The other tool I find amazing is the Autocorrection Upright Tool. I have often been bugged by doors, windows, and wall corners in an image that are not perfectly vertical, unless it is done in the extreme as a special effect. Wide angle lenses that are not pointed level to the horizon are notorious for creating that problem. It used to be fixable with a lot of tedious manual perspective adjustments and tweaking, but now it can be done automatically. The Upright tool in Lightroom 5 does a quick analysis, and zap, instant fix!

# 2015 Suggested Photo Opportunities


