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I recently spent 4 days along the Big Sur coast in a workshop moderated by Alan Ross and Ted Orland. Both were assistants to Ansel Adams and in fact, Alan was chosen by Adams to be the exclusive printer of his prints which he has done for the past 40 years. I traveled to places along Big Sur I knew existed but didn't know how to get to and also into the coastal redwood groves growing in unique micro-climates. I didn't get a lot of images but came away with lots of interesting bits and pieces of what I have termed "photographiae".

Alan is a nuts and bolts kind of guy which is not surprising considering he started as a mechanical engineering student at Berkley before turning to photography. That isn't to say he comes up short in his creativity as evidenced in the images on his website, <a href="www.alanrossphotography.com">www.alanrossphotography.com</a>. He continues working in film, most often with a 4x5 field camera and wet darkroom, however, he has ventured into digital in the last 3-4 years. He provided lots of information that all of us very old guys would remember... zone system exposing, film and paper chemistry, temperature/time equivalents, camera, light meter and film calibration etc. Who's interested in that stuff? Well, a good 40% of the class was working in film and all sorts of wet printing processes.

Ted, on the other hand, is the quirky (in a good sense), funny, adventurous one. He has devoted much of his post Ansel Adams time teaching and writing. Why quirky? I invite you to search his website (truly, you need to "search" it) <a href="https://www.tedorland.com">www.tedorland.com</a> and look at "One and a Half Dome", "Zero Visibility Possible", or "Alien Truck Abduction" (the truck is where he found it...no Photoshop) along with his other work. Also take a look at his Facebook page and scroll down to see some of his latest technical explorations.

Two amazingly accomplished photographers taking pretty divergent paths having both been mentored by Ansel Adams. If you listen closely, however, you hear the same underlying mantra of clear image making and quality processes that they took from their time with Adams.

Much of the non-field work time was spent in storytelling, and providing anecdotes and history of some of the more famous names in photography. Both new Sally Mann and Ted has kept up a friendship with her. She has just published a memoir, Hold Still, that has gotten rave reviews. I hope it will provide some insight into her unique psyche. I have seen a number of her images, unfortunately only in books. They can be beautiful, ethereal, haunting or disturbing but they don't leave you without some reaction. If you haven't seen them, search for them on Google. There are a couple of interviews with Charlie Rose that are fascinating, one done in 2003 <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=kQShT\_eToY0">www.youtube.com/watch?v=kQShT\_eToY0</a> and one done recently on CBS Good Morning America to coincide with the release of her book <a href="https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sfPBfqE9sCs">www.youtube.com/watch?v=sfPBfqE9sCs</a>. I think you'll find them interesting.

I'll leave you with an Adams aphorism:

"There is nothing worse than a sharp image of a fuzzy concept."

# **Adventures in Wide Angle Spaces**


We are going to the Old Country again next week, Portugal and Spain this time, and in thinking about photographing architectural masterpieces such as the Alhambra as well as quaint structures along the narrow streets of Seville and Cadiz. It occurred to me that it might be useful to have a wider angle lens along. I am planning to take, as usual, a wide range ("travel") zoom, a Tamron 28-300mm with my Canon 6D. It's a pretty lightweight setup, easy to carry (comparatively speaking). But sometimes 28mm is not wide enough and/or may not provide the "super wide angle effect" that can lend more drama to a shot.

As I was thinking about this, fate intervened in the form of one of Canon's periodic special offers, including the 17-40mm f/4 L: a \$100 American Express Rewards Card. (Actually, I consider that "rewards card" thing a real pain in the rear. Why not just give a \$100 discount, which they sometimes do?) Anyway, that convinced me I should go ahead and get the lens. It made the price about the same as a used one, and I had my eye on that item anyway.

So I ordered the lens from my favorite source. It came promptly, but I was busy and didn't get to try it out for a couple of weeks. But finally I did.

Just to review. What is a super wide angle lens for anyway? Of course it can get a lot of stuff in the frame, which makes them good for architectural work. And that's fine. But I think what's really interesting about these lenses is their ability to get very close to an object, have that object take up the majority of the frame, and still have the rest of the image in focus. In fact, the perspective distortion characteristics of these lenses, which becomes more pronounced as the focal length shortens, is the most interesting thing about them. Then there's the capability of making a portrait with the background context in focus.

My conclusion: The lens is great. Super sharp images. But I am not certain I'm going to keep it. Why? Because I found that the super wide angle properties that I wanted were just too modest at 17mm, in my opinion, and I already have other lenses that provide sufficient "normal" wide angle coverage. In the future, I probably will want something closer to 14mm or even 11 or 12mm – really crazy super wide angle, in other words. Live and learn.

# **Exploring Digital Photography with Photonaut**

## "Know Your Camera"

How many times have you heard that? I have had my current camera for over 4 years, and I have used it continuously and referred to the owner's manual countless times to learn how to do various things as they became necessary. However, I learned a week ago that sometimes I forget things, especially when I only do them infrequently, and that can get me into trouble.

Several times a year, at big family get togethers, I take interior family shots with up to a dozen people in each image, including myself. This requires the whole 9 yards of photo equipment, including camera, tripod, remote shutter trigger, large umbrella with flash on a stand, smaller reflector with flash on a stand, several (2 or 3) slave flash units with a master controller mounted on the camera, gray card for exposure metering and color correction, etc.

Unfortunately, a week ago as I was just starting to set up the large umbrella and reflector, people were already milling about to be included in the picture. Setting up all that equipment and testing it takes more than a couple of minutes, so I hurried up as much as I could.

Once everything appeared to be ready, I set the camera to Av (Aperture) mode to ensure an adequate depth of field for everyone to be in focus. The people were positioned standing in the room, and a series of images were made. Quick review showed the shutter speed was too slow, anyone that moved in the slightest was blurred, because the E-TTL flash metering system was just filling the ambient light already in the room. So, I decided to switch the camera to Manual mode to set a higher shutter speed while also retaining the desired aperture and depth of field. I knew the E-TTL flash system would automatically compensate for the quicker shutter speed and become brighter.

After positioning the people again, another series of images were taken. Review on the camera screen and histogram showed they were usable but a bit dark. That is when the trouble began. One of the participants who owns the same camera model tried to change the settings on my camera, and started to have trouble in one of the camera's menu screens. Seeking to increase the brightness, the automatic exposure compensation screen was frozen and would not allow changes to be made. That led to a lengthy back and forth discussion about what was *wrong* with my camera, in front of all the people waiting to be photographed. It took me several minutes to figure out what was happening... I finally remembered automatic exposure compensation is *disabled* when the camera is in Manual mode. To brighten the images without changing aperture or shutter speed, we needed to go to the automatic flash exposure compensation screen that controls the E-TTL flash settings.

Most of the time E-TTL flash systems are wonderful and accurate. I normally don't have an exposure problem when using off camera flash, but in this case using mostly reflected flash in a large room, the E-TTL system was under lighting the scene.

Hopefully, I won't make the same silly mistake again, especially in front of a dozen people. I just need to remember, in Manual mode automatic exposure compensation is disabled..... in Manual mode automatic exposure compensation is disabled.....

# "Is Your Camera Ready for Your Next Shot?"

After a photo shoot, outing, travel vacation or a simple trip across town, are you anxious to download your shots and weed through them to find what Gary Moss calls "the heroes?" Like me, you probably delete some that were not exposed properly, or perhaps were taken with a blurry photobombing intruder and not worth saving.

Immediately after downloading your images, do you put the memory card back in your camera and reformat it, or insert a new memory card in the camera so that it's ready to take more photos in a moment's notice? Do you promptly remove the battery to recharge it and replace it in the camera with a fresh one so you are always ready to take your next shot? Do you make sure your lenses and filters are clean and ready for your next click? Is everything tucked into your camera bag, ready to be grabbed the next time you leave the house?

I'm a *photoholic*. It's beyond a passion and more of an obsession or an addiction. Keeping my camera ready at all times with a versatile lens is a habit I have adopted. I take my DSLR camera almost everywhere I go, except shopping. Most of the time it is within reach in my vehicle, keeping it covered or putting it in the trunk. After all, I might feel compelled to pull over and capture a shot, or ten. Bringing along spare lenses with various focal ranges is also helpful.

I don't want to regret leaving my camera at home when I see the incredible red clouds over the beach during sunset, the magnificent reflection on the Morgan Stanley tower during the golden hour, aircraft dropping Phos-Chek over a wildfire on a hillside, the magnificence of wildflowers or any other object or shadow that might create fantastic abstracts. Even a "car-b-que" is worth a shot that the newspaper might accept to compliment an article. It might be that one-in-a-million shot!

Recently, when I felt that my photography became stagnant, I scrolled through Flickr for inspiration. Then I ventured out into unfamiliar territory with my camera to see new things around me that might challenge my creativity and be of interest to some of the Flickr groups I joined with weekly theme assignments. My camera must be ready for whatever compels me!

Either my smart phone or pocket camera will suffice in a pinch (i.e., while shopping), because as a photoholic, I need to *always* have some sort of camera with me. Both have limitations, they do not have long zoom lenses and cannot shoot RAW. That is why I keep my DSLR ready at all times....




