Happy New Year! I had wonderful holidays with family and friends and hope you had equally enjoyable holidays.

As you are now aware, our projector crashed just before the year-end judging. Fortunately we got through using Susannah's projector. As a result of generous contributions from, John Ferritto, Ken MacGregor, Hank Stoutz, Joyce and Bruce Schoppe, Les Collier, Phil Knepper, Ed Ruckles, Bernie Goldstein, Albert Huen, and yours truly, we have been able to purchase a new projector without the expenditure of any funds from the club's treasury. We have ordered an **Epson PowerLite Home Cinema 2040 Full HD 3LCD** which, as of this writing, is on its way from B&H Photo and Video (with neither tax nor shipping charges). Looking forward to seeing its increased High Definition (HD) quality at our January meeting. HD is twice the image resolution of our old projector.

As of this date, I am still awaiting the Franchise Tax Board ruling on our request for "tax exempt" status. This will be the final piece of the organizational restructuring and none of us should have to speak or hear about this again for a long while. Exploration of new liability insurance to cover our meetings, the officers/directors actions and most importantly provide liability protection for photo field trips, if affordable, is in progress.

Art and Photography – A Continuing Exploration

My wife, Heidi, and I recently returned from a couple of weeks in Cuba – our second trip

there. Cuba is a wonderful place for photographers – colorful, old and interesting buildings, lots of very cool 50's US cars (still running), friendly people who don't mind being part of your photographs (but sometimes a little something helps), and a strong emphasis on the arts of all kinds. Indeed, it was an artist – an actor/dancer – who provided me with what might be termed an epiphany. Readers may recall from some of my previous ramblings that I have struggled with the concept of "art," how it is defined and, particularly, how we as photographers relate to it. If you look up the definition of art, you will find that they can vary,



sometimes quite a bit, whether using a dictionary or asking artists. One Merriam -Webster definition is typical, but not unique: Something that is created with imagination and skill and that is beautiful or that expresses important ideas or feelings. But this kind of definition is unsatisfying, at least to me. Why? Because they don't truly define what is, and is not, "art." Who is to say, for example, whether a work was created with sufficient imagination, or that the ideas expressed by it are important enough? Is there an "art – not-art" scale somewhere? Other definitions come with similar problems.

And that was the epiphany. The actor/dancer said that a dance done alone was nothing more than a dance. In his opinion, for it to be art, it needed performed in front of an audience. If we generalize his idea, we can just state that the interaction among the audience and any work of art is a necessary condition for that work to be called "art." So I'll run with that.

Following this, a definition of 'art" would be: **A work created by human skill and imagination which is intended for display or performance.** The creation can be a painting, dance, a photograph, or anything else, and the audience can be a room full of people, a museum gallery, a website, or even a photo club meeting.

Note that the definition says nothing about the quality of the work or the reaction of the

potential audience. It might be good art or poor (whatever that means – but that's another subject), and the audience might like it or throw rotten fruit, give it great or poor reviews, and/or comment about it on Twitter. Some might pay large sums of money for it – or not. No matter. It's still art.

There are plenty of ways to illustrate this definition, but I'll start with the dance group that the Cuban actor/dancer was referring to. An image of the group performing is to the right.



Of course, I took a lot of other photos in Cuba, and I like to think they are, potentially, good art. One is above, and + I'll include a couple more, because I can't resist. I might devote a later column to Cuba, too.

When we arrived back in Miami, the art theme was reinforced because one of the largest art

shows around, Art Basel, was in town, and we attended. I have never before seen so much 6+ figure art for sale in one location. According to the above definition, it was all art, although I am tempted to make an exception for the crushed car with the boulder on top. It sold, we were told, for just short of a million dollars, however, so what can I say? I must admit, though, that the boulder had eyes and, I guess, a mouth. So that was worth something(?). Then there was the marijuana art. As far as I could tell, it was just some MJ buds in beakers and they weren't even real because that stuff is not legal in Florida. I didn't get a selling price.

I didn't see much photography there, but I might have missed some. The pieces I did see were excellent. My favorite was an exhibit devoted to Roy DeCarava, the Harlem photographer who died in 2009. I don't like him just because Heidi and I shared a table with him and his wife at a New York jazz club for an evening about 2005, and the next day we saw an exhibit of his work at the New York Museum of Modern Art – but I have to admit

that it does help. I like him because he did so well what an outstanding urban photographer should do – make images with verisimilitude. You can almost hear the jazz or Billie Holiday singing, or feel the streets of Harlem. It is interesting and strange to me - that a DeCarava image of Coltrane doesn't fetch the high prices of an Andreas Gursky's Chicago Board of Trade - or a Cindy Sherman's Untitled #96. But that's the art market. If you want to see some of DeCarava's work, you can find it online. You can buy some yourself, too. It is not cheap by any means, just not in the 6-figure range – yet. And there are a number of very fine books of his work available.

The New Year is here, and it is time for us photographers to get out there are create some art. Now that we know definitively what art is, we have no excuses.

Photoshop Fundamentals

This four week on-line course is geared to the beginner and intermediate Photoshop users who want to learn basic Photoshop fundamental techniques for creating higher end, fine art images. More advanced Photoshop users will benefit from the Photoshop fundamental review and the emphasis on working with composition and design to create better images. If you have taken this course with Sherron in the past and would like continue where you left off, there is a special returning student rate.

The Photoshop program itself is a complex program but you don't need to know all of Photoshop to create great images. In my opinion, if you know the fundamental Photoshop principles and know how to use them well, and also follow basic design concepts, you can create gallery quality art work.

This class is more than just a Photoshop technique class. It is also a digital art course. You will learn Photoshop concepts but the main goal of the class is to push your images beyond what they are right now. The fundamental Photoshop concepts you will learn in this class will give you the skills to achieve that goal. I think of photography and Photoshop as art "tools" so, in addition to learning the Photoshop techniques, composition, design and color concepts are also covered. Creating artistic images are what separate you from everyone else and creating artistic images will make your work more desirable to clients.



Announcements (cont'd)

This course is a hands-on, work at your own pace, class. In addition to the download course material, there will be links to video tutorials to help visually explain various key topics in the course material. Each week students will download course material and assignments and work on-line with the instructor, posting images and asking questions. Each participant will be given individual feedback to help them analyze their images with more of an artistic eye. Students are encouraged, but not required, to post "Before and After" images, along with a brief description of their creative process, so, in addition to learning from Sherron, students are exposed to a variety of creative and artistic ideas and learn from each other. Students will gain compositional design knowledge and Photoshop skills that can be applied to any photographic style. Students are not required to post daily assignments. 

Hardware: A Wacom tablet makes painting on layer masks easier but a tablet is not required for this class. Your computer and Internet connection must be adequate to access the videos.





<u>Pay Attention!</u> With our new increased HD projector resolution, the below info has changed!

All images submitted for projection must be in jpg format with pixel dimensions not to exceed: 1920 width and/or not to exceed 1080 height (1920x1080). This is the industry standard High Definition (HD) format, and is TWICE the resolution of before. Images that exceed either of these dimensions will not be shown.

Images submitted using the old resolution max format of 1024x768 will still work, but will appear *smaller* on the HD projector's screen.

Note that the new standard HD format is a slightly wider 16:9 ratio, versus the old standard 4:3 ratio (which was the equivalent of 12:9).
