

Photography is Expensive - Or Is It?

The latest and greatest single lens reflex camera has just been announced. It is a marvel of current technology and was designed by the world's leading photographic visionaries. A complete line of high quality lenses and other accessories are available in order that it can be applied by both professionals and serious amateurs to virtually any photographic situation. It is a new innovation in photography - the first camera of its type ever to be produced. Indeed, this camera will revolutionize the camera industry for the foreseeable future. How much for this great new camera? With its most expensive lens, only \$165. Only one problem. The year is 1936, and the camera is the Kine Exakta 1, the world's first 35mm single lens reflex camera. The country of manufacture is, of course, Germany. It certainly was a



revolutionary camera. Besides being the first 35mm SLR (not the first SLR), it had interchangeable lenses, a focusing hood and magnifier, multiple shutter speeds from 12–1/1000 sec, a self timer, flash synch, even a built-in film cutter, and lots of other stuff. It was, and is, a great camera as well as a milestone product in the history of photographic technology.

What would a comparable camera today cost? Exakta is not around anymore, so I picked the latest Nikon, the new mirrorless Nikon Z6. When you can get one, it will cost about \$2600 with a 24-70mm f/4 Nikkor lens. It is a digital camera, of course, and has a resolution of 24 MP, which is just about the maximum attainable by 35mm film. (That's one reason why I didn't use the Nikon Z7, which costs about \$4000 with the same lens and has a 45.6 MP resolution.) The price of \$2600 appears to be more than the Kine Exakta until one takes inflation into account. It is true that many factors go into inflation calculations, but simply applying cost of living changes from 1936 to 2018 to the original \$165 increases the price to about \$2900 in 2018 dollars. In other words, the new Nikon actually costs less than the 1936 Exakta! And when you factor in the additional capabilities of the Nikon, such as its ability to do 4K video, as well as the many other features of current digital gear, its \$2600 cost, along with the price of its competitor products, almost seem like bargains.

That got me thinking about other cameras. Would the same factors apply to them?

I have a Leica M3, 1955 version, with a f/2 Summicron lens. It cost \$447 new according to a couple of contemporary listings. You can't get a Leica for that anymore, but \$447 (1956) is about \$4200 (2018). Can you buy a current Leica M, the M10, with a f/2 Summicron for that? Unfortunately not. That kit will cost about \$9700. The digital revolution and current manufacturing techniques that kept costs down for Nikons and Canons doesn't' appear to apply to Leicas which are still more mechanical and constructed by highly paid German craftspeople.





I also have a Nikon S2 rangefinder with a Nikkor f/1.4 lens. It cost \$345 in 1956. That would be equivalent to \$3200 now. Nikon doesn't make rangefinder cameras anymore, but I could buy a very nice Nikon – or Canon or Sony - with an excellent lens for that price today – and even get some change. It is interesting that the Nikon S2 was 77% of the Leica M3 price back in 1956. Today that ratio, using the Nikon Z6 and Leica M10 prices above, is 27%. Is the Leica that much better – or better at all? Not in my opinion, but I'm not paying \$10K (and up) for it, either.



Let's look at another example. My first SLR was a Honeywell Pentax H1, purchased in 1962 for about \$170. It was a very basic camera. It had a 50mm f/2 SuperTakumar lens and shutter speeds 1 to 1/500 second and an instant return mirror. No zoom, no autofocus, no autoexposure, not even a built-in exposure meter. I used my trusty Sekonic, which still works, by the way. But 170 bucks was a lot of money then, more or less equivalent to \$1400 now, and you can get any number of outstanding "starter" enthusiast cameras with very good lenses for much less than that from Canon, Nikon, Sony, and others. And they will even do 4K video! An expensive example is the Sony a6300 with 16-50mm zoom for \$998, effectively cheaper than my old Pentax and a whole lot more powerful.

Can we learn anything about photo equipment prices from this admittedly unscientific study? I think we can. First, it does not appear that, overall, camera prices have gone up when one factors in constant dollars, particularly considering advances in photographic capabilities. In some cases, they even seem to have decreased. Second, we find an exception in the highly specialized and, some might say, luxury segment of the photo market. Third, you can have a lot of fun looking at those old camera catalogs. It brought back plenty of memories for me.

We can be certain, too, that camera technology will continue to evolve. Nikon and Canon finally have introduced full frame mirrorless bodies and new lens mounts. The era of the flipping mirror introduced to the 35mm camera by Ihaghee Exakta 82 years ago is finally nearing its end. Those innovations do come at a price, but, as we have seen, the price may not have been as high as you supposed.
