Coast & Mountain motorcycle rides

"From high-mountain passes to ocean-front boulevards, rural roads, scenic highway and more, the Vancouver Coast and Mountain Region is heaven on two wheels for people who live to ride."

That's the way the Things to do, Vancouver Coast and Mountains Tourism Region web page greets its viewers.

On the site are a collection of rides based in the Lower Mainland that are designed with the motorcyclist in mind. Each suggested ride come with a route plus motorcycling events, things to do and featured restaurants and hotels and tourist attractions.

Here are two examples:

Sunshine Coast Route

Howe Sound to Desolation Sound - Approximately 493km round trip, including ferry distances

Start by taking the 40-minute ferry from Horseshoe Bay across to Langdale. Motorcycles are generally the first to board the ferry and the first to disembark on the other side. Be sure to head outside on the viewing deck while onboard, as the trip takes you through a beautiful area and sometimes you can even spot wildlife such as dolphins.

Once you're on the other side, head onto Highway 101 which provides access to most communities on the coast. Highlights along the way include beautiful beaches, marinas, serene forests and more. Be sure to venture off onto side roads, which offer some great twists and turns. The stretch of highway between Sechelt and Egmont is also full of curves and will keep riders on their toes.

Hop onto a second ferry to the Upper Sunshine Coast. A 50-minute ferry ride will take you from Earls Cove to Saltery Bay. Highway 101 will continue on to Powell River and then to Lund. Consider parking your bike and hopping on the water taxi from Lund to Savary Island, where you can enjoy the white sandy beaches. You could

also take your bike across on the short ferry from Powell River to nearby Texada Island to do some exploring.

Afterwards, head back down the coastline towards Vancouver. Don't be surprised if you end up wanting to spend a few extra days on the Sunshine Coast!

Anther route is the:

Coast Mountain Circle Route

Approximately 593km round trip

The Coast Mountain Circle
Route provides riders with a
truly remarkable experience.
Enjoy magnificent vistas, outdoor
adventures, delicious cuisine and
much more on this trip. Start this
route in any of the communities
along the way, but keep in mind
that you'll get the best views if
you travel counterclockwise from
Vancouver.

As you head east from Vancouver to Hope on Highway 1, you'll see skyscrapers on your way to the Port Mann Bridge, a tolled engineering marvel with views of the Fraser River on either side. City scenery quickly turns into lush, green farmland, rolling hills and views of Mt. Baker as you continue eastbound through Langley and Abbotsford. As you ride through Chilliwack and Hope you'll see why this area is a fi shing paradise, with

its spectacular river and mountain views.

Once you reach the Fraser Canyon just past Hope, you'll see some more amazing views of the Fraser River as well as colourful rocky cliffs set amongst a more arid landscape. Just past Yale, make a stop at Alexandra Bridge Provincial Park for a quick walk to the beautiful old bridge before continuing on to Boston Bar and Lytton. From Lytton, head from Highway 1 onto Highway 12 towards Lillooet.

Next, it's on to the stretch of Highway 99 between Lillooet and Pemberton that is also known as Duffey Lake Road. Both locals and visitors alike love the beautiful scenery, curves, remoteness and generally sparse traffic. Highway 99 between Squamish and West Vancouver also offers up some stunning views of the Stawamus Chief (a granite monolith), the glittering water of Howe Sound and the surrounding mountains.

Be sure to stop at Porteau Cove Provincial Park on the way back to Vancouver – picnic tables and beautiful views make the park a popular rest stop for riders. As you continue back to Vancouver, you'll see city lights and skyscrapers once again.



If you have an old airhead and are having turn signal problems, the cure may be easier that you think, Indeed, it may be free, too.

My 1974 R90/6 has a single up-and-down handlebar switch and what the manual calls a hazard signal relay inside the headlight bucket. Other airheads have different handlebar switches, but all work much the same way.

For a while, my signals had worked fine - but without any flashing of the warning light on the instrument panel. I knew that the battery the bike came with was too small and I assumed that this was mostly a voltage problem.

This diagnosis seemed to be substantiated in the beginning because everything worked better as the engine revs (and the battery voltage) rose.

But eventually the signals became weaker and weaker. Finally, they quit.

I ran careful tests on the battery and alternator with my multimeter and it was clear the original assumption was wrong and that the problem didn't lie there. So I pulled the relay out of the headlight bucket and examined it. I could have tested it off the bike, but this would have involved a fair amount of wiring, alligator clips and a couple of test bulbs and I couldn't be bothered rigging this up.

There are four wires leading into the relay. A little thinking (and a check with the wiring diagram) told me that two of these went to each set of turn signals, one went to the warning light between the instruments and the fourth was the power source from the handlebar switch.

This, of course, raised the question of where the ground was. Then it dawned on me: The ground was the steel bar inside the headlight that held the relay in place.

A rudimentary brass spring both holds the relay in place on the bar and, via three pivot points, grounds the assembly. The brass on my 40-year-old, matchbox-sized relay was brown and this was presumably the problem.

I sanded the brass as best I could and got the pivot points shiny bright again. (Later I tried a small amount of metal polish and a toothbrush, but the emery paper worked better).

I hung the relay back on its bar, turned on the key and tried the handlebar switch. All four signals blinked in sequence and the warning light was also illuminated on each pulse. Total time involved: Perhaps 20 minutes. Total cost (creative accounting regards the emery paper, metal polish and toothbrush already in my workshop as no cost): Free.

In fact, the good news is that this relay (like most airhead parts) is available at Island BMW. It's made by Hella. The bad news is that it costs \$110.

This was a good reminder about diagnosing electrical problems. Don't assume anything, just work your way sequentially through the component parts and you'll almost certainly find the problem. It may cost you nothing, too.
