Ethanol: Everything you did or didn't want to know

Like it or not, ethanol in pump gas is here to stay. Although it does reduce pollution in our atmosphere, it can cause problems for many collector cars, boats and motorcycles because of some of the detrimental effects related to its use.

Ethanol is ethyl alcohol which is the same alcohol found in your glass of beer or wine. Ethanol is added to gasoline to reduce carbon monoxide emissions and boost octane levels. Nowadays most cars can run on an ethanol fuel blend of up to 10% which is the most common gas sold in the US. This is known as E10 fuel. You might also have heard it referred to as gasohol or renewable fuel, as the ethanol comes from renewable sources. Ethanol is refined from grain alcohol; most specifically corn here in North America, but it can also be made from switch grass, manure, willow trees, and even sugar cane in some countries.

The use of ethanol will only increase. Federal law in the U.S. mandates the use of 36 billion gallons of a alternative fuel per year by 2022. The only way they would get there is to buy more gas – which is unlikely to happen, given the cost of a gallon these days – OR - increase the "ethanol content" in each gallon. Many recent production motorcycles are able to accept E10, but unless your owner's manual states

specifically that it is an E85 or Flex Fuel compatible, you cannot use E85 fuels.

The GOOD:

• Ethanol is clean-burning and is a higher-octane fuel than conventional gas.

• Ethanol is produced from renewable sources.

• Ethanol-powered vehicles produce lower carbon monoxide and carbon dioxide emissions.

• Ethanol production keeps farmers in business and creates new farming and ethanol processing jobs.

• Because ethanol is produced domestically, it reduces dependence on foreign oil and increases the nation's energy independence.

• Ethanol production requires less fossil (coal) and petroleum (gas) fuels to produce a BTU of energy opposed to gasoline, although it does require much more water.

The BAD:

• Ethanol creates 34 percent less energy than unadulterated gasoline per gallon.

This equals a loss in fuel economy of up to 3 miles per gallon for E10 fuels. In terms of heat, ethanol produces 76,330 BTU per gallon, whereas diesel fuel produces 128,450 BTU per gallon, gasoline 116,090 BTU per gallon and LP gas 84,950 BTU per gallon. The fuel economy gets even worse with E85, a loss of 7 to 8 miles per gallon with

• Ethanol is corrosive. It erodes fiberglass, rubber hoses and plastic fuel lines. It contributes to rust in fuel systems by creating condensation in the unfilled portion of gas tanks. It will also dissolve varnish and rust in steel fuel components. These dissolved ingredients sit in the bottom of gas tanks until they are removed or they will enter the fuel system if the fuel level in the tank gets too low.

• The main problem with ethanol fuel is that it absorbs water from the atmosphere, it's Hygroscopic!. Even fuel with a small amount of ethanol such as an E10 blend can absorb up 50% more water from the atmosphere than gasoline.

• Ethanol Causes Fuel Separation. A major problem with ethanol fuel from the maintenance standpoint, is that it absorbs water from the atmosphere. Therefore, once the amount of water in the fuel reaches saturation point, it causes the fuel to separate into two layers; one thick and one thin. The thick layer contains gasoline and a small amount of ethanol. The thin layer contains water with ethanol. Even a small amount of water will cause this separation. Even in a modern sealed fuel system water can separate out, for example when there are changes in temperature.

So what is the concerned owner to do? Especially if their machine is sitting unused in the garage more than it is on the road? It has been stated that you can counteract the poor fuel mileage by driving at a consistent speed of between 40 and 60 MPH but that doesn't really apply to the average moto enthusiast or ZOOMER!

Several recommendations of things you can do that should help come from OE Marine Manufacturers who have been seriously battling these ethanol-related fuel problems.

1. Replace any plastic or rubber fuel lines with ethanol-resistant hose or nylon tubing.

2. Install a water separator filter in the fuel line leading to the carburetor. Water collects in the filter and can be removed periodically.

3. Replace any fiberglass tanks with steel or aluminum.

4. Ensure that any O-rings in the fuel system are also ethanol-compatible.

5. Keep your tank as full as possible to prevent air space where condensation can form.

6. Use ethanol-specific fuel additives. These are normally blue in colour.

7. Vent your fuel system during storage for extended periods; the moisture your fuel system might absorb from the outside will be less than the moisture created in the air space inside. This perhaps sounds counter intuitive, but it is a reality during indoor storage.

8. Use a fogging solution in your carburetor or throttle body during storage prep. to prevent condensation from collecting in fuel bowls and passages.

9. Use of isopropyl alcohol-based dry gas will help to absorb system moisture. Isopropyl-based additives actually combine with the water molecules and remove moisture through the combustion chamber while in operation.

10. Use of a flex fuel-compatible fuel filter where possible will prevent degradation of the paper media in your filter by water in the fuel system. There are also stories floating around that imply the "absence" of ethanol in high octane pump gas, well not necessarily

There are differences between states on whether premium gas specifically has ethanol in it or not. Or, more correctly, whether it's required to have it in it. Missouri and Montana, have specific exemption to allow ethanol-free premium gasoline. So if you fill up in one of those two states, you can be thankful.

Otherwise, we are faced with the unpleasant reality that the refineries are all but tied into putting ethanol in premium gas. This is because they have to use the ethanol to raise the octane level of their gasoline blend in order to satisfy the higher octane requirements of premium.



Ethanol final word - Use the Blue

This is one reason why you don't get better gas mileage with premium gas, because an essential part of that blend is a component that has less energy and forces the gas mileage down simply by nature.

So don't get fooled into thinking you can escape ethanol's grasp simply by paying more and getting premium gas. Avoid Ethanol Supplemented Fuels if you can. However if you must accept ethanol fuel be prepared to add the proper Ethanol Oriented fuel additive as required, as per the manufacturers instructions.

The Bottom Line: Pay Attention When You Refuel!

With a little planning and attention to detail, you should not experience any major difficulties. However it is clear that the Ethanol movement has generated additional costs, directly passed on to the consumer, again! It certainly appears that due diligence is required to protect you and your ride from the possible ravages of this " fuel of the

future"!

Remember..... use the Blue Stuff!
