How we found Peter the Pigeon

Hello there, I see that Ellen Cocking has mentioned for 2 months running now in the Yarnton News that Peter the Pigeon is doing well and thriving. I personally am very pleased to read this news, but I'm unsure if many others will know who Peter the Pigeon is. I'd like to tell you the story of when my dog, Casper, and I stumbled across this very poorly birdie...

It was on a reasonably warm afternoon that Casper and I went for a stroll. I decided it would be nice to walk alongside the stream on the A44 dual carriageway. It was so warm that as we crossed the little footbridge from Meadow Way onto the footpath of the dual carriageway that Casper decided to climb straight down the bank and lie down full length at the bottom of the bank into the cool waters of the stream that runs through there.

I crouched down beside him, letting him cool off, and as I looked around my eyes lazily wandered along the stream to see a pigeon, sitting in the water, about 15 feet up from where we were. I was puzzled. I had never seen a pigeon standing in water like that before. I thought through the birds that I had seen in water before: a duck, a swan, a coot hen, a heron ... but a pigeon...? As I looked at the pigeon, he was looking straight back at me with his bright yellow eyes, and I noticed his feathers all around his bottom were wet through. Something wasn't right, I came to conclude.



Casper continued to steam as he lay in the cold stream happily cooling off and had no interest whatsoever in the pigeon. As Casper eventually climbed out of the water I coaxed him over to the bridge and tied his lead to the wooden post. I had decided this pigeon needed a closer inspection. With my training shoes and jeans/t-shirt on, I walked slowly and quietly along the bank towards the pigeon. I considered trying to stand with my legs astride on either side of the bank standing over the pigeon to reach down with my arms and lift him out of the water, but I quickly realised my arms weren't that long. No, I'd have to get into the water myself. The water didn't penetrate my waterproof trainers at first! But then the pigeon decided to make a walk for it and inevitably the water sloshed over the edges of the trainers and yes, my feet were soon submerged. As the pigeon tried to scamper away from me I could suddenly see the full extent of the difficulties this poor chap was in: he had been hit by a car, I guessed, and one of his wings with all the feathers was completely broken in half and hanging off, blood smeared everywhere. I managed to put my hands around him and splint his broken wing in my hands, holding it against his body. We both emerged from the stream and up the riverbank, out of the low undergrowth and into the sunlight of the footpath. Now what, I thought to myself?

As I was standing there with both my hands around the bird, not really knowing how I could help him and walk with my dog, I saw two women approaching from the direction of the Budgens garage, one with a bicycle. As they approached I walked towards them asking if they could help me. And blow me down with a feather (pun intended!) it was Ellen Cocking, who was accompanied by a friend who had first spotted the pigeon and went to get Ellen to help. I happily handed the pigeon to Ellen as we wrapped him in a tea-towel and gently placed him into a soft canvas bag she had brought along, covering his head to keep him calm, and placed him in the front basket on her bicycle. Ellen remarked to me at the moment she took him from me how nice and warm he felt, which I hadn't noticed. But clearly he had been rescued in time.

It was quite extraordinary that I saw him, to be honest. Had Casper not got into the stream I would never have seen him and had it been two weeks later the undergrowth was so suddenly spurting in growth that again, I couldn't have seen him. A bird marked, for sure, for saving. I am thrilled that he is doing so well. I really didn't think he could survive with such a nasty broken wing like that. But clearly, Ellen is a great physician and she reports that he is doing really well.

So, Peter the Pigeon, it seems, one exceptionally lucky bird, and a great team who rallied and were able to rescue the wee chap. Thanks to Ellen and to her friend who went to find her for help. This feel like it is a success story indeed and one to warm the heart.



Plant a Poppy Commemoration of the outbreak of WWI and beyond

On hearing about the Royal British Legion's 2014 Real Poppy Campaign to commemorate the outbreak of the First World War, that could also see the British countryside turn itself back into how it looked back in 1914, I feel that if the public engages with this in large numbers, social benefits far exceed the British Legion's aims. I normally write solely about wildlife gardening, but this project should perhaps be focused on and rolled out as a well-oiled larger campaign, which I am hoping to start in these articles.

To commemorate WW1, the Royal British Legion is distributing poppy seed to the public and asking them to scatter them in random places, i.e. hedgerows, traffic roundabouts, empty back garden borders, planters, preferably not somewhere mown regularly. Then this time next year when they all flower, we will be looking at a display of poppies in remembrance of all that happened during the Great War. We could make this a global movement. This not only benefits the countryside, but if communities get involved this could be the trigger that ignites a lifelong interest in nature for children.

Poppies are a poignant reminder of the Great War, as the battlefields after the war were colonized soon with poppies, and this is because poppy seed needs to be on the surface of bare soil to germinate. It would be no good scattering the seed where vegetation is growing. Plough almost any area of the countryside, leave the area bare, and poppies will grow. This is much the same as what happened after the end of WWI, or what happens when areas are disturbed by road works, etc.

I must warn though, care needs to be taken with this project; although I am not aware of poppies being on any list of proscribed weeds that can be a pest, like ragwort and creeping thistle, this needs doing methodically. Some areas may contain rare species in themselves, which need protecting from unfocused acts of seed sowing. Many areas though would benefit from an increased plant diversity which would improve food chains. It's the balance we strive for. To do nothing isn't always going to help that balance either.

Many of our wildflower meadows have disappeared, so there is room for redressing that, without causing an imbalance in doing so. If, for example, practices in agriculture changed, poppies would spread once again. That would probably be considered acceptable, so giving a helping hand, if managed properly, isn't too much of an issue in my view, especially as much of our soil contains poppy seeds anyway.

We must avoid spreading the seed near Sites of Special Scientific Interest, and also avoid farmers having to spray more herbicides to control the poppies - do not sow near farmland. Perhaps the problem on farmland is as follows: In the old days crops were harvested in late August and September. By this time, the poppy seeds had burst out of their pods and were lying on the ground so they would not get mixed in with the crop seed. Nowadays, crops are harvested much earlier, and before the poppy seeds have dispersed, so the crop seed gets mixed with the poppy seed. This apparently is not a good thing. I'm promoting this idea in all the wildlife gardening tutorials and lectures I give, and in all the articles I write, and even in the independent wildlife radio show I make. I'm happy to assist with anyone who wants to get involved with this. After all, engaging people with Mother Nature is my job. It is my belief that we should start a campaign to build on the British Legion's idea; this should be done yearly until we get our poppies back. People just need to be aware that the bare soil they are sowing onto needs to be disturbed each year and not compacted, otherwise the seed just won't germinate. How can this fail if we all do our bit?

If this works, we can all in some small part experience the countryside as a past generation did, and in the process bring communities together, with grandparents working alongside children, etc. *Stuart Mabbutt, Wildlife Gardening Specialist, tel.01865* 747243

Every Wednesday at the Village Hall about 25 older members of the village community meet for lunch and conversation, catered for by a small group of volunteers including the cook and helpers. The group is affectionately known as 'The Lunch Club'. To join, a phone call to the organiser Brenda Louch is all that is needed. However, the Lunch Club can only continue if we have enough cooks, and at present we need at least one more person to take on this role, so Brenda asked me to tell the Yarnton News readers what it's like to be a cook.

I have no catering training and am a part-time office worker now. Cooking though is one of my loves: for the family, for friends and my kids' parties and sleepovers. Cooking for the Lunch Club is a bit like cooking for the family, but five times over, although it doesn't take five times as long.

Most of it is fun: choosing what to cook, usually traditional dishes like cottage pie, but also a bit adventurous like Moroccan chicken with sweet potato.

Home-made puddings are much appreciated, whether traditional trifle, rice pudding or crumble, but occasionally when time is short we have to admit to the diners that we bought ready-made puddings. They understand.

Buying the food, getting best value, as we are all trying to do today, and learning to keep the costs down so that income from the diners does not exceed the costs of the Village Hall and the food, for which we get reimbursed.

Ensuring 25 meals get served on time and hot, and the really good feeling that comes from having achieved that with the support of the other helpers

The quiet of the diners eating, the empty plates coming back with the compliments about how everyone has really enjoyed the meal. This instant feedback and thanks as diners go home leaves me happy too, knowing that it has been a job well done. There is a down side.

It's quite hard work for something over half a day a month. Four kilos of potatoes and carrots to peel on a Tuesday night can be daunting. I enlist the support of the family.

It can get a bit scary if the potatoes don't want to roast brown and its 12.45 with lunch due at one! Brenda, the helpers and the diners are very understanding and forgiving, especially if one is new or trying something different!

By 2.30 when everything is finished, the need for a cup of tea and a sit down is very strong, but I go home knowing I've been involved with 25 other people's enjoyment of the day. That's grand and I'm still doing it after nine years!

This was a phrase often used by Jack Nichols, onetime bishop of Sheffield. By this, he was trying to describe the work of the church, and how it is experienced by those within it. It serves just as well today, and at a local level. The next few months seem to be filled with all sorts of activities all involving fun, celebration, laughter, food and wine. Prayer, and parties in Yarnton and Begbroke are in full swing!

This is yet another person making a further step on the journey of discipleship, just like our confirmation candidates who will be celebrating next week with Colin in Woodstock Church. Things are moving, things are growing, bit by bit. We are welcoming Hugo into an international church that has its issues, that is suffering growing pains, just like all community groups and organisations at this time. There will be times in his future when he wonders what it's all about, when doubt creeps in, or a nagging voice takes over. The moment when all this is swept away is at 11.00 a.m. on a Sunday morning.

As I look at the faces of my parishioners (and I can now see them, thanks to moving the altar), I see a group of friends, some of whom are in church because they are curious, some because they are exploring discipleship, and some because they enjoy a good sing song. Some have been coming to church for decades, and some are new to faith. We are all there because we all enjoy being part of a community.

When Jesus got his mates together, sat on the seashore, cooked on an open air BBQ and had a good old time, he was setting us an example. Surely, if he could come to our lovely church, he would be pleased with what he saw? *Nathan*



Reflections on the Healing Eucharist - from a member of Yarnton Church

It is a privilege to be asked to share personally what the recent Healing Eucharist meant to me because, as a relative newcomer to Yarnton, I have found weekly gatherings around the Communion Table to be a wonderful gift. What is it about the Eucharist, and this time a Healing Eucharist at St. Bartholomew's, that took it beyond just a religious ritual, and made it, in the midst of our daily lives in Yarnton, a profound meeting place?

Entering the sacred space of St. Bartholomew's church, even with others present, we find, in the quietness and peace, space to be with our own thoughts and feelings – why have I come? What is it that I am hoping for? In the liturgy, this is helpfully called 'preparing our hearts'. God is aware of us here, always listening, hoping, looking into our hearts, inviting us to look for Him. As we join in with worship and the journey of the liturgy, we are reminded by our welcoming priest Nathan, of the hospitality of God, and of his indescribable love for mankind. He extends again the invitation of Jesus, to come to the communion table, to receive from Him. Jesus designed this special meal and menu for us to share in again and again. He specifically asks us to 'His meal', and to meet him at 'His table' but doesn't demand that we RSVP by a certain date nor worry about a dress code. Instead he invites us to come anytime, in faith just as we are, in sorrow and in joy, but with a desire to remember.

Whether we join in with the words of scripture within the liturgy or just listen and reflect on them, we hear once again the truth of what God has done in sending his Son Jesus to suffer to the uttermost in his self-sacrifice on our behalf, to identify with us humanly. This both softens our hearts and strengthens our faith, to recognise that Jesus really can meet us in our circumstances, in our own need for healing or concern for others. He didn't go to the cross just to identify with us in our humanity and leave us there. No, our journey doesn't stop there – because we are led to remember the wonderful truth and power of his Resurrection. He rose again, for us, to triumph over death and sin, and was reunited with his Heavenly father and Holy Spirit in relational wholeness. Christ's journey from heaven to earth and back is why we can come to God, through faith in Jesus to seek healing and wholeness. This triune heavenly relationship is not exclusive, because a place has been created through Christ for us, here, now and into eternity.

In walking ourselves, or with the support of others, up to the altar to receive the sacraments, we are taking our place at God's table of grace. We can encounter God's healing in Jesus' broken body in the taking of the bread, and cleansing by blood shed, in the wine, whether or not we expect it. God promises that we can find what we need in putting our faith, however minimal, in Jesus as Saviour, the one who gave his life to bring us wholeness, restoration and transformation, 'to make all things new'. God's unconditional love enables us to come again and again, and to ask Him to reach into the very core of who we are, into places hidden away in our hearts, places of pain and constriction, diseases, fears, exhaustion, anger. Nothing is hidden from Him and he invites us to be honest with Him and with ourselves. He wants to show us what needs putting right, to restore his Kingdom of Love, in our lives and communities.

Beautiful cello music was played during the Communion to help us focus on meeting with God and to reflect on the amazing gifts of Christ's Body and Blood so freely given. Holy water to symbolise God's cleansing was sprinkled lavishly on those who wanted it, outdoors in the warmth of evening light. Laying on of hands and prayer were available in a quiet space within the church. Sometimes out of my own experience of these moments when I don't clearly know what I need from God, or can't find a way of expressing that – simply choosing to receive from God whether through the sacrament, prayer or Holy Water, can often be the most powerful.

Meeting with God and with one another as part of the body of Christ, in the Healing Eucharist was significant for me personally. There is something beautiful and deeply moving about God's sons and daughters, friends and strangers shoulder to shoulder, acknowledging their individual need of God, but coming together in unity, to receive from Him. The Healing Eucharist is a meeting of reality and mystery, a stepping stone or starting point to restoration, a profound life giving meeting with God and others.

From a concerned village resident

Please could cyclists using the Gravel Pits Lane to Broad Field Road 'path' be aware that it is a footpath not a cycle path.

We are concerned with the amount of bikes that are speeding down this tight path when young children/older people are using it as a footpath. The footpath is No.15 Gravel Pits' land but is also a right of way for pedestrians. No.15 did try to maintain some notices provided by the council, but these were ripped off. They also tried growing the hedge out to slow cyclists down.

The Oxfordshire Woodfuel Programme has launched a woodfuel standard, OxLogs, which aims to improve woodfuel quality in Oxfordshire, and counter the uncertainty of what is meant by 'a load of seasoned wood'. OxLogs suppliers will specify the volume, moisture content, type of wood (hard or soft) and length of the wood. When you buy logs, ask for OxLogs! If you own a woodfuel boiler - chip, pellet, log batch or wood burning stove with back boiler – please fill out a short survey at <u>www.surveymonkey.com/s/9SZBD9T</u>? The results will help others who are thinking about installing similar boilers.

If you own a woodland that needs managing, or are interested in working outside in return for logs, do join the programme's Logs for Labour scheme as either a 'log offer' or a 'labour offer'.

The woodfuel programme will have a stall at the Elder Stubbs festival on 17th August; and the Wychwood Fair on 1st September. Do come along!
