





Synopsis

Amahl and the Night Visitors is an opera in one act by Gian Carlo Menotti with an original English libretto by the composer. Menotti wrote Amahl with the stage in mind, even though it was intended for television broadcast. It was commissioned by NBC [television] and first performed on December 24, 1951 in New York City, at NBC in Rockefeller Center, where it was broadcast live on television as the debut production of the Hallmark Hall of Fame. It was the first opera specifically composed for television in America. The opera is now a popular Christmas classic.

The opera is set in Bethlehem, in the first century, just after the birth of Christ. The story begins when the very modest home shared by Amahl -- a physically-challenged boy -- and his mother is visited by three splendidly-dressed kings who need to rest, as they in the midst of a long journey to visit a wondrous child . . .

Dr. Willis Patterson

Dr. Willis C. Patterson, professor emeritus of voice and past associate dean, joined the faculty of the University of Michigan in 1968 after having taught at Southern University (Louisiana) and Virginia State College. Dr. Patterson has concertized extensively in the U.S. and Europe and has appeared as bass soloist with major American orchestras. He was a Fulbright Fellow and a winner of the Marian Anderson Award for young singers. Dr. Patterson, who appeared as King Balthazar on NBC-TV in its production of Menotti's opera Amahl and the Night Visitors, has been seen professionally in such operas as Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, Beethoven's Fidelio and Puccini's La Boheme. He has served as president of the National Association of Negro Musicians and as executive secretary of the National Black Music Caucus.

William Ray, Baritone

William Ray, born in Lexington, Kentucky, began his vocal training in his home town. He continued his studies at Kentucky State University, Frankfort, Kentucky; Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, from which he received his Bachelor's degree; Case Western Reserve, Cleveland, Ohio; Boston University, Boston, Massachusetts (Master's Degree); Academy of Music, Vienna, Austria; and the Heidelberg University, Heidelberg, Germany.

While performing at the Karamu Theater in Cleveland, Ohio he was offered operatic contracts to sing in Vienna, Austria and Frankfurt, Germany. These appearances led to engagements in other major opera houses, with major orchestras and conductors. For 25 years, Mr. Ray sang throughout Austria, East and West Germany, Italy, France, Scandinavia, the Netherlands, and Russia, in opera, concerts, and oratorios.

Having become knowledgeable in European languages, Mr. Ray appeared in various roles as an actor and singer on German and Austrian stages, radio, and television.

In 1982, William Ray joined the Peabody Conservatory of Music, as Professor of Voice. He continues to return to Europe for concert appearances.

Did you know? ...

- The Italians often say "In bocca al lupo!" when wishing a student luck on exam or performance. It means: "in the mouth of the lion"
- "Break a Leg!"- The leg is the part from which the main curtain hung. To 'break a leg' was to have the curtain raised and lowered so many times as to break it, and of course the curtain would be abused as such if you had such a particularly impressive performance that the audience prolonged the curtain call by continuously applauding and thus calling you back onto stage (in between which the curtain was raised and lowered many times).
- "Toi, toi, toi!" Is often said in opera houses everywhere but originates in Germany. It means "I am glad we are in the battle side by side, I wish you luck!" or "Alles gute! and Hals und Beinbruch! Have the same meaning.
