Independence Day - from Linda Lloyd

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these rights, are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness".

Reportedly, this is one of the best known sentences in the English language.

Interestingly enough, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, both signers of the Declaration, died on July 4th, 1826, the fiftieth anniversary of its adoption, within a few hours of each other.



July 4th is celebrated in many different ways, the most notable being the fireworks display and a celebration at the National Monument in Washington D.C. each year.

We are so fortunate to live in a country whose founders believed in religious freedom, so much so that they set out on a dangerous journey, at the peril of their very lives, to find a new world where they could be free to worship in any way they chose. Even today, people are still being persecuted for their religious beliefs in many parts of the world.

Our founding fathers were brave enough, and smart enough, to draft a document that would spell out the specific

freedoms, including the freedom of religion, which they fought and died for. That document has stood the test of time for the last two hundred and forty years.

The very first amendment to the U.S. Constitution contains two clauses which guarantee freedom of religion and freedom of expression. Religious freedom and freedom of speech were of the utmost importance to these men-the reason they left home and hearth in search of it.



So this July 4th, when you're eating that hotdog or setting off those fireworks, attending a Ranger game, or watching our nation honor its heroes at the celebration in Washington, D.C., take just a moment to remember the real meaning behind "Independence Day". And utter a prayer of thanks to the Lord God Almighty for all his goodness to you.

"But among the Lord's people, women are not independent of men, and men are not independent of women. For although the first woman came from man, every other man was born from a woman, and everything comes from God". (1 Corinthians 11:11-12)

Bell County's Sacrifice

I was reading an article in the Killeen Daily Herald awhile back about, of all things, license plates. The columnist gave the following statistics.

The state average for DV (disabled vet) tags is 1 in

every 173 vehicles. But in Bell County, the average is 1 in every 24 vehicles. The state average for a Purple Heart plate is 1 in every 1,191 vehicles. In Bell County, the average is 1 in every 201 vehicles.

The columnist further stated that "This community has given more to the defense and service to this country, than any other community in Texas, and possibly, in the nation."



He went on to say that the military plates were not "vanity" plates; that they were earned with sacrifice, blood, and valor. He ended the article by saying "That's a lot of sacrifice, that we should all be grateful for."
