



#### Gray is Good from Walt Tindell

Our society doesn't see gray hair the same way the cultures in Bible times did. In those times, gray hair was a beautiful representation of a wise, elderly and much-respected person. <u>Proverbs 16:31 says:</u>

Gray hair is a crown of glory; it is gained by living a godly life.











Today, gray hair has become a symbol of someone who is slowing down, which may be why some seek to conceal it. ## Benevolence Meeting Third Quarter 2016 - Nancy Healey

Quarterly meeting was held Sept. 25, 2016 with the following attending: Shirley Pinkston, Jeannette West, Cindy Pennington, Jerry Schleicher, Joan Ray, and Nancy Healey. Absent were Ann Faber and John Booher.

Carl presented a brief introduction to a solar program being undertaken by several Presbyterian churches within our Synod. It was decided to further research the program and discuss in greater detail during fourth quarter meeting.

The committee decided to follow a 60/40% giving guideline-supporting local agencies 60% and international 40% so the following agencies will receive distributions from our Benevolence fund for this third quarter:

• AWARE \$1000.00

• Body of Christ \$1000.00 (divided 50/50 between medical and dental needs)

• Salado Fire Dept. \$500.00

• Salvation Army-Temple \$1000.00

• Presbyterian Children's' Homes \$1000.00 (quarterly)

• Presbyterian Disaster Assistance \$1500.00

 Plus continue to provide bread to the Salado Food Pantry on a bi-monthly basis.



#### Wai'oli Hui'ia Church

"i ka poli o Hanalei — in the heart of Hanalei" Founded 1834 Hanalei, Kaua`i, Hawai`i While Trish and I were in Hawaii celebrating our fiftieth wedding anniversary we attended this church in Hanalei. The service was conducted in both Hawaiian and English. We felt welcomed and it was a very loving experience. This article printed in the bulletin caught my attention:

Each Sunday, I enter worship in full command of my emotions. But it often doesn't last. A verse or phrase of a hymn I have sung for decades strikes me in an entirely new way. I reflect on how God has worked in my life, in the lives of my loved ones, and in members of the church I attend. A flood of memories and feelings pours over me. I am overwhelmed with gratitude for God's grace and mercy, and tears come to my eyes.

For many years I could not have imagined standing in church, unashamed of my lack of composure. I could not have imagined being comfortable talking about my faith, or praying in public. Then, through many different experiences, not all of them positive, God broke through my shell of insecurity and self-protection. God put agents of grace in my path, and opened my heart to their acceptance and love. When I finally understood that God is present and active in my life and the lives of others, I became more confident in my faith and more committed to grow in it.

Some may think of God as abstract and remote. But for me, the opposite is true. The Holy Spirit can transform the way we experience God, inviting us into a personal relationship with our Creator.


# Sunday School Kickoff and September Social
