### Carl's Comments - Reverend Carl Thompson

What is patriotism to a Christian? It is more than singing patriotic songs, waving the flag, and feeling emotionally stirred over our nation's heritage. As we celebrate Independence Day, let's consider what patriotism is and is not.

I've seen a lot of hostility expressed in the name of patriotism. It's very easy to demonize those who take opposing stands regarding political issues and call them un-American. The conflict between our two political parties is not a struggle between good and evil. We should hold strong convictions regarding political matters, but we need to be civil toward opposing views.



Americans value their freedom, but for many, freedom is the right to do anything. Taken to an extreme, freedom is anarchy and lawlessness. Society needs rules to be able to maintain order. People claim you can't legislate morality, yet if you think about it, most laws have a basis in what we believe is moral behavior and fairness. True patriotism recognizes that we answer to a higher authority, that it matters how we live as citizens in a world God created.



God has given us great blessings in our country. These blessings are worth preserving through prayer and devotion to God in the face of those who would tear it down. But it is so easy for our nation's leaders, and for us, to be too prideful. Now, this doesn't mean that we can't have pride in our nation. There is absolutely nothing wrong in being appreciative that we live in a nation that has been GREATLY BLESSED. But we are not to become arrogant.

Furthermore, we are not to think that we have become a great nation by our own power and strength. We need to remember these words as we practice our patriotism, "If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land." 2 Chronicles 7:14.

Patriotism involves taking a stand, writing letters to those in authority, and supporting candidates whose ideology concurs with our convictions. 
#### A Summer Prayer

JR Lett swears there are no words to describe monotony in a desert. As a soldier who has the distinction of invading Iraq twice, JR believes that makes him an expert on the subject.

"First of all, it's quite an enormous and therefore very slow operation on arrival to organize soldiers, equipment and begin deploying to the assigned location," explained JR. "Then you're in a staging area where there's considerable down time. And it's the same thing going back. What's really ironic was landing in the desert the second time in 2003 at the very same place I was the first time in 1991!"

JR proclaims it doesn't take long for boredom to begin whenever the Army's "hurry up and wait," routine begins. Checking equipment, performing guard duty, playing cards, electronic games, reading adventure novels and talking about home and family only lasts so long.

"You can't go anywhere because there's nowhere to go in the desert. And even if there were, it's off limits," added JR. "And the scenery all looks the same: nothing but sand and icky critters. Therefore, soldier morale does become a concern."

So, when the subject of a tank drag race was casually suggested by his crew, JR decided the best thing to do was just let them talk. Before long, it wasn't just talk.

JR had always loved tanks with their heavy firepower and strong armor. He inherited his affection for the majestic armored fighting vehicles from his father, who would give him the oath when JR decided to join up. He compares the vehicles to football in that it can be a rough and tumble type game, especially during maneuvers and actual combat. And while some may view the huge iron contraption as simply that, to JR it represents a tremendous feeling of adventure. Especially when driving through the ranges, playing war games, or the competition to be the best in tank gunnery qualifications.

There's also the bonding in tank crews that develops and grows due to their assigned tasks. Each crew member has an intricate, but essential responsibility. The driver makes sure the tank and crew arrive at their assigned area on time and safely. This means accurately following the tank commander's directions while scrutinizing anything and everything in front of the vehicle. He must consider the current driving conditions, the kind of terrain the tank is moving over, and be on the lookout for any obstructions that might be hazardous such as a sudden large body of water.

The gunner protects the tank and crew since he's the one who pulls the trigger and fires, while the loader ensures the tank has the correct and right amount of ammunition. The loader also stores the ammunition, but the whole crew helps with the ammunition loading process which lasts about three to five seconds.

The tank commander has the overall responsibility for the tank crew. As the ranking officer, he gives the orders to his three other crew members. Again, JR compares those orders to football in that the commander controls the operation just as a quarterback instructs his players where to move when executing a play.

"It's vital each crew member have confidence in one another," added JR. "The knowledge everyone is working together, and having faith each soldier is executing his vital task in a professional manner is what binds us together and promotes bonding."

Although the four team members have different tasks and responsibilities, no one is independent of the other and each must know the other's job backwards and forwards, inside and out, and right side in - just in case.

"War is a life and death business," explained JR. "You don't know when the worst could happen and you have to keep going because other lives are at stake. So, we're four individuals with four different jobs who come together to complete one mission. And that's why we cherish that exceptional brotherhood we call camaraderie."

When it became obvious to JR the tank drag race was on, he carefully selected an old airfield runway nearby. About 100 feet wide and two miles long, the field was perfect for the race. He also offered to be the flag bearer signaling when to start and stop.

The rules mandated there be three races. Since there are four tanks in a platoon, there would be two races between two tanks. The winners of the two races would then compete in a third race and an overall champion declared.

As the tanks moved side by side into position, enthusiastic spectators gathered to watch. In true drag racing form the tanks began reving up their jet engines, a clear indication the event was being taken quite seriously. With great ceremony JR gave the start signal, and the official Operation Iraqi Freedom drag race began! In all their glory the magnificent, steel machines sprang forward, each determined to be the first one over the finish line. Both races lasted 15 to20 seconds and after two winners

were confirmed, preparations immediately began for the final competition.

After the initial race, JR had become somewhat anxious. His tank, "Bandit," had won the first contest and now it was gearing up to compete for the highly prestigious and soughtafter championship title. To JR, his honor, competency as a tank commander and reputation was at stake.

And being a native Kentuckian, JR now ranked the tank drag race with the prominent Kentucky Derby held at Churchill downs, the world's most legendary racetrack. Glancing around, he could almost picture the traditional, dazzling hats proudly worn at the annual event by Derby patrons instead of the drab Army head gear. "And it was as if my horse, uh... that's my tank... was in that glorious race and all I could think of was win, win, win!!! Saying a quick prayer for his crew, JR signaled and the tanks took off.

"They were going downhill so they were able to get good speed," said JR, conjuring up the memory of watching the impromptu race that now had spectators jumping up and down and yelling encouragement to the participants.

JR needn't have worried. When the race was finished, amid whoops and shouts, "Bandit" was declared the official winner by one by tank's length! The winning tank crew was grandly applauded by their fellow Army soldiers who had eagerly welcomed the spontaneous sports event. There was no official prize, but JR says the pride and bragging rights will do. And they have lasted him a lifetime.

"It was that typical GI fun thing," laughed JR. "Everybody was watching and later said they wished they had joined in. The tank drag race provided that comic relief from the earlier 16 hour convoy to Bagdad and the one coming up to Bashara."

JR believes discovering something unique to do when soldiers get together is significant because it prevents them from dwelling on what may be disastrous situations ahead. JR also stressed the importance of faith. "Just like the philosophy there's no atheists in the foxhole, well, I've never seen one in a tank either."

JR also shared the secret to winning a drag race for future Army tankers. "Get a quick start, keep the pedal to the metal, charge forward! And always keep your opponent in the rear-view mirror! June 25, 2017 - Hotdog Social
