Carl's Comments - Reverend Carl Thompson



When I was younger, I used to like reading *Popular Mechanics* magazine. The issue I really enjoyed was the one where they predicted what the world's technology would be like 10, 20, 50 and 100 years in the future. Some of these predictions were "right on" and others never came close to fruition.

Several years ago in a newsletter, I asked you to think about where you thought our church would be fifteen years from now. Where will the Holy Spirit lead us to fulfill our niche for God in this community and the world. Things just don't happen by chance, we need to look out into our future with the help of the Holy Spirit and develop vision, then a plan on how to get there. We might hit the mark "right on" or in some cases miss it by a mile, but without a vision we may find ourselves just going around in circles.



Since then, we have done well in continuing to draw new people to our congregation. Some of our members have gone on to their heavenly rewards, and others have moved away to be closer to their families, yet our membership has remained fairly consistent.

Two Presbyterian churches in the immediate area have closed as have many other Presbyterian Churches in Texas and around the nation. This loss is going on in all denominations. We have been blessed because **you**, have talked to your friends and neighbors and invited them to worship with us. This is the way we get new members.

In a national church survey it was reported that people are drawn to a church not because of the Pastor, or the denomination, but because a member invited them to come. Where will we be five years from now? That depends on how many people you invite to our church.

Mission Outreach Report

Thank you for your generous contributions this summer to the Heart & Hands Ministry and to the Military Support Project of the Salado Republican Women! Both of these local mission projects have assisted many persons. While the Military Support Project will end this month, our congregational support of the Heart & Hands pantry and clothing shop is on-going, and your continuing contributions to the basket in the Narthex will certainly be appreciated. Remember that if you have other items for Heart and Hands they are open the 2nd and 4th Saturdays from 9 to 11 AM.

Brightly colored backpacks and big cartons full of school supplies filled the rec room of the church last week. Salado Family Relief had its annual Back to School event, using our facility to dispense 125 backpacks and supplies to qualifying families residing in the Salado Independent School District. This year the organization spent over \$6000 for supplies and backpacks to ensure local students were sufficiently equipped to start the school year. (Salado Family Relief is one of our Benevolence recipients.)



The members of the Benevolence Committee will meet later this month, as they do quarterly, to distribute your gifts to mission agencies. They will also sponsor the mission speaker from Salado Family Relief at the 5th Sunday worship service on September 30th. Marilyn Griffin, coordinator of the agency's Back-to-School Backpack Program will share its results. Our congregation donated funds for the project, as well as providing the distribution site. Your benevolent donations are sustaining an important outreach to those needing assistance, both here and abroad.

They say "Write what you know." And what I have known a lot of for the last couple of years is pain. I have learned more about pain than I ever wanted to know. (I'm sure that most of you can identify with that statement).

It's been a 24 hour a day struggle for me. With so many different health issues, it's hard to figure out which one is causing the problem. Do I need back surgery? Do I need a hip replacement? To quote Yul Brynner in his famous role as the King of Siam, "Tis a puzzlement."

I think about the apostle Paul every day. Mostly I think about his petitions to God to "**Remove this thorn in my flesh**". And then I immediately think about God's answer. HE said, "**My grace is sufficient for you; my power is made perfect in weakness.**"



I was sitting in my car, after yet another doctor's appointment. They'd done another hip x-ray, which had only exacerbated my pain; and I started to cry. I reached into my purse in search of a tissue, and instead I pulled out a card that I had placed there a couple of months ago.

When I read the words printed on that card, I cried even harder. (But these tears were ones of gratitude, not distress). This is what it said: "**God has a purpose for your pain, a reason for your struggle, and a reward for your faithfulness. Trust in HIM and don't give up.**"

I have written several times that "God always meets you at your point of need." And he does! So I will continue to trust in HIM because I know he cares for me. There are 350 times in the Bible where God says that he will ALWAYS be with us. And I believe it is true.

A Note from Molly



Molly Hatchell - Ordination March 4, 2018

What a joy it was for me to have many of you with me (in person and in spirit) in March when I became ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament. It was especially poignant for me since I believe my internship with you in 2014 set me on this path to ordained ministry. Your grace, kindness, and encouragement then, and continuing, is surely the type of good works that is a testimony to the love of Christ and the glory of God.

I wanted to share with you the ripple effects of that mission project. You can celebrate that, in the last nine months, over 800 patients in hospitals from Round Rock, Austin, and down to Kyle, were supported with spiritual and emotional care. As a chaplain for Seton Family of Hospitals during that time, I served a diverse patient population in multiple hospitals. There were patients from all sorts of cultures including the homeless, prisoners shackled to their hospital beds (with two police officers in the room), teenage mothers-to-be, newborns in the ICU, and patients who spoke Russian, Hausa (Nigeria), Swahili, and Spanish.

On more than one occasion the patient said something like “I was just praying and you walked in – your visit is the answer to my prayers,” or “Your visit helped me to know God is with me, I was losing faith.” And one my favorite exchanges, one I overheard from a nurse to a doctor: “Oh, it’s okay now, the chaplain went in to see her, her blood pressure is down now.” We don’t really know the impact of our service as chaplains, but it’s satisfying, sharing the compassion and grace I have received from God and God’s people (like you), and offering it to others. I hope you enjoy knowing the fruits of your labor.

My chaplain residency program at the hospital ended last week so I’m back in the discernment process, watching for where God will lead me next. Here is a poem that helps to give me strength in this time of waiting:
