Carl's Comments - Reverend Carl Thompson



This month we will celebrate Palm Sunday and Holy Week - a time when we remember the events of the last week of Jesus' life. Our Holy Week will begin with a Maundy Thursday service and end with our Sunday Easter service. On Maundy Thursday, the church remembers the last evening Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room before his arrest and crucifixion. *Maundy* is derived from the Latin word *mandatum*, meaning "commandment," and refers to the commands Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper concerning communion and his call to us to love one another. I encourage all of you to come out at 6:00 P.M. on April 18th to be a part of this service. Join with us again on Easter Sunday Morning to celebrate the resurrection, as we boldly proclaim, "Christ Has Risen."

Many of you have been asking how the search is coming for my replacement? It is coming along as quickly as possible. We have done all we can do until the church information form is approved by Presbytery and sent to Louisville (our denomination headquarters) for distribution. After much prayer Evelyn and I decided not to retire until January 2020 unless we find the right person sooner. 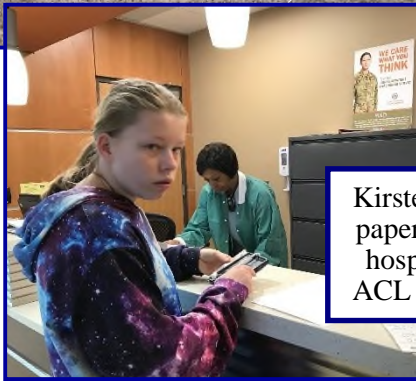

LEGACY - by Linda Lloyd

We attended the funeral of Ralph's aunt, Benita Castor Martinez, who loved the Lord more than anything in life. We heard her family, friends, and pastor's testimony to her strong abiding faith, her lifelong witness for the Lord.

Each one attested to the fact that she loved her family fiercely, but loved God more, and served him in every way that she could, even when she moved to a nursing facility.

Benita was neither educated nor wealthy. She never had, never wanted, worldly goods. She and her husband worked in the fields to support their family. Benita also ran a full service gas station. She was a strong woman who made changing a tire look easy.

She had five children, including an adopted newborn. The family lived in the gas station with no running water, and no heat.

A salesman came to the gas station selling Bibles. Benita wanted a Bible so badly! She had heard about the gospel and wanted to find out for herself what it was all about. She had no money to buy a Bible, so instead bartered for it with S&H green stamps.



Once Benita had the coveted Bible she read it in every spare moment. She read that Bible from cover to cover, then started all over again. Her children related that she


cried and cried for a whole month after finishing it for the first time. Neither she nor her family could understand what she was crying about. Eventually, Benita talked to a local minister who informed her "Benita, you are crying because you met the Lord Jesus in the pages of HIS sacred book. You have been saved. HE has filled you with the Holy Spirit and your soul is rejoicing in the Lord."

Benita was an honorary chaplain to recovering alcoholics in the Alcoholics Anonymous program. She witnessed and counseled them several nights a week. She witnessed every day to everybody she met. She made mission trips overseas to witness for her Lord and minister to those who hadn't heard the word.

Benita went to meet her precious Lord on March 22nd, 2019, leaving behind two sons, three daughters, twelve grandchildren, and twenty one greats. At the memorial, the grandchildren spoke of their Abuelita's joyful nature, passion for Bible reading, and her joy in spreading the gospel. They said they would enter her house to find her reading, praying, praising the Lord, hands raised in worship, tears streaming down her face.

In the eulogy, grandson Alex summed it all up. He said "***Her legacy was not her family. Her legacy was JESUS, only JESUS.***"

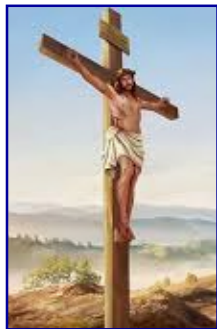

LESSONS FROM HOLY WEEK - by Pete Stebbins

The Men's Prayer Breakfast has been reading/ studying the Book of Luke. During almost the entirety of the Book, Jesus is the ideal human, healing the sick, casting out demons, performing miracles, and teaching his disciples. All goes well except maybe His dealings with the religious leaders.

On a number of occasions he actually predicts the future. He knows what is going to happen next, including his own crucifixion! We find in *Luke 18:31-33*: *Taking the twelve disciples aside, Jesus said, "Listen, we're going up to Jerusalem, where all the predictions of the prophets concerning the Son of Man will come true. 32 He will be handed over to the Romans, and he will be mocked, treated shamefully, and spit upon. 33 They will flog him with a whip and kill him, but on the third day he will rise again."*



It's amazing how our lives can change so quickly and dramatically. It happened to Jesus.

The Bible warns us that there will be trials in our life. You may have been blessed with the ideal life, so far, but this will likely not last forever. I warn you that there will be problems, trials, worries, and burdens in your life. Bad things will happen! God created a perfect world but gave humans the right to choose. We have not always chosen correctly.

The good news is that God can guide us through these tough times and will be with us - as He was with Jesus in during Holy Week.

In my life I have had some big trials and lots of little ones. I'm not sure I would have made it through without God being at my side via: faith, prayers, the Word, the Holy Spirit, and Christian support.

Rom 8:28 And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. This "all things" includes some really bad things.

John 16:33 "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." This comment "you will have trouble" is directly from Jesus.

Romans 5:3-4 We can rejoice, too, when we run into problems and trials, for we know that they help us develop endurance. And endurance develops strength of character, and character strengthens our confident hope of salvation. These "problems and trials" can be building blocks as we grow in our faith and prepare us for our day of salvation.

Luke 11:9-10 "So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. 10 For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened." There is a way to work through these problems and trials. Jesus says ASK for help. You can even ask again and again.

Matt 6:34 Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own. Let God be in charge of worrying, you don't need to.

Matt 11:28 Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Don't forget that when you have burdens, give them up to God and don't just hold onto them yourself.

Luke 12:24-26 Look at the ravens. They don't plant or harvest or store food in barns, for God feeds them. And you are far more valuable to him than any birds! 25 Can all your worries add a single moment to your life? God does love you. One of these days, while you are still in bed, listen to the birds outside. Let this remind you, that if He can take care of all them, surely He can take care of you!

Conclusion:

What can we learn from Jesus about dealing with crisis's as we study the events of Holy Week?

- ◆ He had a close relationship with the Father,
- ◆ He had intense Prayer conversations,
- ◆ He took comfort from the Scriptures,
- ◆ The Holy Spirit was with Him,
- ◆ His disciples and family stood beside him.



We need to be prepared for the "trials" that will come into our lives. Jesus has shown us the way!

Benevolence Committee

Since Easter is coming soon, so is the **One Great Hour of Sharing! OGHS**, as it is also known, has been promoted by the Presbyterian Church for seventy years. We will collect this offering during Worship on Palm Sunday and Easter. You will hear more about those who benefit from it during Minutes for Mission on April 7 and 14.

The prophet Isaiah called his people to become "repairers of the breach," or to help those in need. His call is coming to us in today's broken world, and **OGHS** enables persons and communities in over 100 countries throughout the world, to seek and obtain improved living situations.

OGHS gifts are divided among three global projects:



Presbyterian Hunger Program receives **36%** of this offering through local partner agencies. It strives to alleviate hunger, to care for the creation and to address the causes of poverty.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance receives **32%** of this offering. It helps communities to recover after devastating natural or human-caused disasters, and it assists communities in supporting refugees. Long-term assistance is available to victims of catastrophic events.

Self-Development of People also receives **32%** of this offering. This program partners with communities experiencing oppression, poverty, and injustice. It educates Presbyterians about the impact that these issues are having in the world.

There is an offering poster in the Narthex. Feel free to take one of the usual cardboard fish banks or special envelopes that are available. If you take a fish bank, please put your name on it before placing it in the offering, to assist with record-keeping.
