NATERA: Right. 4 In that budget that you have over there --5 I don't have the exact copy; sorry. 6 Can I see the --7 8 MR. CABELLO: Take it --9 MR. NATERA: Yes. 10 What you have in front of you, if you see that orange -- light orange kind of color on top, 11 12 is the current budget for each AMP for each site. All right? That's what that is. 13 And --14 15 MR. CABELLO: The green one. 16 MR. NATERA: -- the green one, that highlighted green over there, is the revised 17 budget. 18 19 Right. You already voted in the first one, 20 now you vote in this one. If you see the common color, the blue light 21 22 color, -- and then you see the dark pink, light pink and purple -- okay, those are each AMP. 23 All right? 24 25 So then just so we -- you could follow me

1 when I go through this.

All right, so what happened to the right hand -- to the right hand side column what you'll see there -- you could compare as you want, if you have any question I'd be happy to answer it.

But if you go to the right hand side column those two -- what that reflects is a 4.7 percent of increase in our subsidy.

MR. CABELLO: That's a HUD subsidy.

MR. NATERA: That's the HUD subsidy.

Right. That is due to the fact that we finally end the sequestration period.

MR. CABELLO: Thanks to Obama.

MR. NATERA: And the Senate -- the Senate and everybody else over in Washington decided they needed to do something, so they're agreeing one of the budget that was presented. And we will be getting a little bit more money than we were getting before.

They -- across the board they were just subsidizing about 82 percent of the presented budget for each Housing Authority. They put it right across the board.

But after the sequestration was over, sequestration period was over, they are giving

1 some more money.

We don't know exactly how much money it's

going to be but I want you to know I was very

conservative about putting my numbers together

and I went under the projected amount three

percent. Just to have some cushion; just in case

Washington changes his mind -- their mind over

there.

But also we have a little bit of increase in our rental income and that is due to the fact that more people are getting back to work and we are being more aggressive in getting their fair share of rent. We're doing over the calculations and everything else.

MR. CABELLO: We have also found a lot of people that were not -- I don't want to say were lying but they were not properly informing us as to their sources of income.

COMMISSIONER GUTIERREZ: Yeah. Yeah

COMMISSIONER CORNELIO: Yeah.

COMMISSIONER GUTIERREZ: Um-hum.

MR. CABELLO: You know, through the systems they coming up.

Gee, I didn't know I was working like, you know, a part time for 20 hours a week somewhere.

13 1 MR. NATERA: And faster, too. Before it was just like about six month 2 3 backup. CHAIRPERSON MARTINETTI: Wow. 4 MR. NATERA: Okay? And for anybody that is 5 making whatever amount of money, it might 6 represent a few thousand dollars per tenant in 7 8 the Housing Authority. So that -- that help us a lot. We also -- I notice an increase of some 10 other incomes like laundry and other income that 11 12 we're getting and that's because we've been --First of all, the laundry, we seen a better 13 return in the laundry machines. People are using 14 15 it more I guess. And they're I guess not going 16 outside to do their laundry. So I was able to project and forecast an 17 increase of about 11 percent on the -- that 18 laundry collection income -- revenues. 19 20 Also, basically, that's generated almost a hundred and forty thousand dollars of extra 21 income just on that. 22 23 And then we worked --One thing I wanted to mention is the -- the 24

boilers that were able to install, the new

boilers, with some funds that we got from Obama with the --MR. CABELLO: ARRA -- ARRA. 3 MR. NATERA: -- the ARRA program, they're 4 finally paying back. I mean we're getting --5 they're paying off now. 6 7 The efficiency of the boilers are much 8 better and we could see that they're burning less gas. And we are able to project a saving of 10 about 24 to 25 percent less in oil --11 12 MR. CABELLO: In the consumption. MR. NATERA: -- in the consumption, as well 13 -- and therefore because we'll also -- will not 14 15 be as big as previous years. 16 MR. CABELLO: Obama said, man, --MR. NATERA: Therefore, basically, compare 17 to one year to the other, our revenue increased 18 19 for about three percent; our utility went down, 20 basically, four and a half -- something like that, including administration and utilities. 21 22 Therefore, if you compare, -- I didn't give you an exact number there but the surplus, 23 compared to the previous budget that we had, it's 24 like about \$230,000.00 less. 25

So now we have from a hundred and fourteen 1 2 thousand I think it was, -- from a hundred and twenty-four thousand we went up to 363,000 as a 3 surplus. 4 Again, this was very conservative. I'm not 5 putting -- I'm not dreaming of anything. As I --6 as I said before, I was conservative; I even cut 7 three percent just in case. 8 And the reason why I said three percent is 9 because two and a half to three percent is 10 inflation factor that HUD grant us so we could 11 12 work with. So in this case, that's why -- that's --13 instead of getting exact amount that I was 14 15 projecting, I cut it down to three percent. 16 So it could be a bigger surplus but I want to be conservative about it. 17 MR. CABELLO: I have to say Raf did a good 18 19 job doing this. He's been here early in the 20 morning and late at night, so he'd --MR. NATERA: I hope those colors don't 21 confuse anybody, right? 22 23 I tried to make it easier. COMMISSIONER DEMARTINEZ: No, no. 24 25 COMMISSIONER GUTIERREZ: No, no, it's

CABELLO: And finally the Executive Director's Report, which basically -- okay. 11 12 First, on page 1, is regarding the North Hudson Sewer Authority versus the Housing of 13 Union City. They're taking us to court. 14 15 So I want to turn this over to Julio, our 16 attorney, so he can go over the details of what we plan to --17 18 MR. MOREJON: Sure. MR. CABELLO: -- intend to do here. 19 20 MR. MOREJON: If you recall last year, last January, the North Hudson Sewer Authority filed 21 really a collection suit against the Housing 22 Authority for nonpayment of our portion of the 23 sewer charges. 24 25 There had been a decision made by the

1 Housing Authority --When the decision made not to pay? When 2 did it start? 3 MR. NATERA: It was back in 2008. 4 MR. MOREJON: That long? 5 That you haven't paid? 6 7 MR. NATERA: Yeah, that's right. MR. MOREJON: Oh. I didn't realize --8 9 MR. NATERA: No, we issued some payment following the advisement of Mr. Marotta back in 10 the days. We issued some payments back in 2011. 11 12 All right and there was -- there was no good results out of that because everything was credit 13 to the interest --14 15 MR. CABELLO: Right. 16 So we stop making the payments. MR. MOREJON: Yeah, what had happened, some 17 payments -- payments were stopped because the 18 19 Housing Authority was not satisfied that it was 20 -- that it was being charged correctly. Imagine you're getting a sewer bill at 21 home. You want -- you know, you contact the 22 Sewer Authority and you want an accountability; 23 look -- and we got no response, no response. 24 Payments were stopped. Payments were resumed. 25

When payments were resumed it wasn't being 1 applied towards the principal balance; they were 2 applying it to an interest. We even questioned 3 the ability to charge us interest. Anyway, long and short of it, they filed a 5 lawsuit last January. We went to arbitration I 6 believe in early November. The arbitrator, 7 basically, split the baby in half. 8 He --10 MR. NATERA: Solomonic (phonetic). MR. MOREJON: Solomonic, yeah. 11 12 They were charged -- they wanted X, we wanted Y and he decided in the middle. 13 We weren't in agreement with the 14 arbitrator's decision, so I filed a notice 15 16 rejecting the arbitrator's decision and now the case has been scheduled for trial March 24<sup>th</sup>. 17 Let me just backtrack. A week -- a few 18 19 days after our arbitration, --20 MR. NATERA: Two days. MR. MOREJON: -- two days after, right? We 21 collectively met -- just to refresh your 22 recollection -- we collectively met at the Sewer 23 Authority. Virgilio, Rafael, myself and Nidia. 24 25 Right?

In fact, there's a 20 meeting tomorrow going on about some of -- some of it. 21 But the connection fees for Passaic Valley 22 and their district will be -- they'll have 23 24 jurisdiction on it, it will no longer be North Hudson. 25
