Board is number 3, which is the Auditing Services 1 for next year, which came in at \$19,056.00 from 2 Polcari and Company, that we re-advertise that. 3 Number one, we only got one proposal. 4 And number two, the price was quite high. 5 The Hoboken Housing Authority had a proposal for 6 13,000 and West New York had one also for 12,500. 7 So this really quite high for, you know, 8 the type of work that they do. 9 10 So, I would like to, you know, suggest to the Board that we just go out -- and we have time 11 12 for this, to go out and solicit more proposals on this. This advice, okay? 13 Yes? 14 MR. MOREJON: I'm sorry, Virgilio, this is 15 16 regarding the Auditing Services? 17 MR. CABELLO: Yes, the audit. Yeah. It's done once a year. 18 19 MR. MOREJON: That's our current auditor; 20 correct? MR. CABELLO: Right. Right. Right. 21 22 Right. Yeah but this one he went way, way too much, man. This is -- one guy's charging 23 \$200.00 an hour and they're a hundred and fifty 24 and they spend here a couple of days, so, yeah. 25

MOREJON: It's for services that the 17 Housing Authority needs, so they -- they bid --18 they bid out the services. 19 20 But in some instances the provider of those services are already under contract but from an 21 existing contract because they're annual and they 22 terminate at a certain period of time. 23
