  - On the last -- on the last column you will find the payments in April, which is -- which -- those are the one that will be approved in this meeting.
  - And that on that particular column you'll see the actual check numbers that are in your check registers for each program.

New Jersey.

This year the State changed the deadline from June 30<sup>th</sup> to April 30<sup>th</sup>. So we had to really move on -- so that's why it was kind of difficult for us. You know?

Okay.

By the way, they --

Okay.

So, Ralphie, you want to explain?

MR. NATERA: Well, as -- as Virgil just indicated the State -- as you remember we're very flexible the time that we submitted our budget to HUD as well as to the State. But this year if we did not submit it by the 30<sup>th</sup> we could be penalized.

This is a new format that the State has required and put us in a spot. Because we have to comply with them just as much as HUD. And the budget that you have in front of you was prepared very carefully. We took every single expense and revenues very accurately.

And -- and the first page that you have, as I mentioned before, you had the four AMPs. The four AMPs are the 455 units that we have as a Public Housing Authority. And each of them had

- 1 -- have to be submitted with their own budget.
- 2 And that's what you have in front of you. And
- 3 each of them has a small surplus adding to
- 4 \$61,000.00, which is gonna go into the reserve.
- 5 Part of the indicator that we use -- the
- 6 REAC -- or Washington, D.C. or HUD requires, is
- 7 | for us to have enough reserve of three months.
- 8 And as a reserve for three months -- in order for
- 9 -- for a score to go up.
- 10 And now that I mentioned the score, this
- 11 | year, compared to prior years, we got to 20
- 12 points financially. If we're able to build our
- 13 reserve then we can go up another point or two
- 14 and then we could be high performance
- 15 financially.
- 16 The maximum score that we get is 25; we got
- 17 | it at 20 right now. So if we lock those -- those
- 18 reserves into place and we -- we take in to
- 19 | consideration for future years, we might be high
- 20 performance probably in the next two years.

  then you have the Modernization funds. They all

  get combined and then we get a freeze out of

  that.
  - There is one glitch in the program that HUD has not taken in consideration there but it works to our favor. Once we become -- our units, 455, become project-based program, there -- there's an extra administrative fee that counts for each unit. And that's where they will jack up the -- those revenues up to about \$850,000.00.
    - CHAIRPERSON MARTINETTI: Do those fees have to be allocated to anything specific or they go --

They're gonna start the depleting from the subsidies from the other -- the other agencies. Is that the reason they capped that at the 2012.

Let's say if -- if the expenses for that apartment, including the rent, so let's say \$500.00 a month, correct? If at some point in time the revenue in the apartment and the rents go down, we'll still be getting the -- (indiscernible) -- at the 500 level. If it goes up, we still get the \$500.00.

So either way you -- you never lose on this thing. I mean not losing but you never -- your reserves will never go down because you'll always have a fixed amount of subsidy. If your subsidy goes down, meaning rents, you're still getting

the -- the complete subsidy. 1 If for any reason the rents go up, you 2 still get the 500, so that's a profit that --3 Not a profit but, you know, --4 MR. NATERA: The rent compensates. 5 6 MR. CABELLO: Yeah. CHAIRPERSON MARTINETTI: Surplus. 7 MR. CABELLO: Surplus. Thank you. 8 9 Yeah. This is gonna make profits here. 10 Okay? So I think it's a great program. I'm 11 12 glad -- thank you, Mr. Chairman, for having the initiative two years ago to participate in this. 13 This is like a real venture, 'cause nobody knew 14 15 what was gonna happen. And this has been coming 16 a long time. At some point in time really, honestly, HUD wanted to do away with Housing. 17 They didn't want to deal with this anymore --18 19 with the funding. 20 And this is the best way they -- they thought about doing it and they made it very 21 attractive to the Authorities to participate in 22 this program. 23 24 So it's like a win/win situation for everybody. 25

72 1 stopped feeding the cats. 2 MR. MOREJON: Okay. MS. BORRERO: So they've been going away. 3 So now ever since now that I signed a new lease 4 that I'm moving, --5 6 MR. MOREJON: Okay. 7 MS. BORRERO: -- now she's going all the 8 way on the other side with a cage, going back there, going around the apartment. 10 So my thing is if I decided -- it's -- it's being inconvenience for me for the things that 11 12 I'm going through right now. Okay? And I was willing to do it with no problem just to solve 13 the issue. And my concern is would it solve 14 anything? I say no. Okay. I say -- I really 15 16 say no. Now, if she has -- I don't know if you --17 somebody else should I don't know come in and 18 take care of the issue of the cats or why should 19 20 she being doing it, I mean I have no idea. MR. MOREJON: I -- I don't have an answer 21 for you, you know. 22 23 MR. CABELLO: May I address the Board?

- 1 situation with that neighbor upstairs with the
  2 problems with the noise and all the issues that
  3 we are familiar with.

5 trap, went out around, came across the street.

There's two 14 15 cats pregnant. This cat has littered this area 16 with -- with kittens. They're over by cable right now. And there's -- now there's only two 17 of them left that I see. But this is the issue. 18 19 I'm the one that sees her go by Adele. Ι'm 20 the one that sees her looking in her windows because I have the advantage. 21 I know she don't like that sit on the porch 22 23

because I see everything. I'm disabled. Can't work in the yard no more. Can't -- can't stand. And if you could ever rip out all those bushes by

24

- those houses I would kiss each one of yous. 1 They They're horrible. It's -- you can't sit outside when it's humid, when it's wet. You 3 can't even walk up the block. 'Cause as you're 4 passing the shrubs, it's horrible. It's really 5 -- it's gotten out of control. 6
  - And, yes, Toni did -- she didn't feed the cats but she brings them up in her house. And she's been trapping them now. She's not a trapper. She's not licensed. I know that much. You have to be licensed to do this.

Now, on another note I notice that two of the new members, Commissioners Martinez and Vallejo, I notice they were abstaining, if I'm 1 not mistaken on everything. So is that something
2 that's standard for new members or does that have
3 something to do with the Closed Session?

Or, you know, maybe my mind's just a little foggy, you know, been a long day, long week for me but, you know, from what I can recall with new members in West New York and, you know, in North Bergen, Hoboken, et cetera, I don't recall that being standard.
