On May 18-20, 2016, the whole 5th grade went on their annual trip to Washington D.C. Everyone had different expectations for the trip. We had 3 packed days of monuments, memorials and history of the United States. Not only did we have our teachers as guides, but we also had professional tour guides who knew so much about Washington, D.C.! Lily Drye did not expect that. "I thought that we were only going to have the teachers guide us!"

The Arlington National Cemetery

was a highlight for many students. Eleanor Roosevelt created the cemetery, as she thought there should be a special place for Veterans and their families to rest after they died. Student, Mariam Saab, remarked, "the most surprising thing...was how many graves there were at the... cemetery." We visited the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, where soldiers without known identity are buried. On the tombstone, it reads, "KNOWN BUT TO GOD." With all the new technology available now, including DNA, one soldier was able to be identified. This tomb is guarded

24 hours a day, in any kind of weather. A lot of students were definitely curious about the changing of the guards. When watching the guards transition, everyone has to be silent. Silence represents respect for the soldiers and the guards watching over them. The expectations for this were very different from the real moment.

Many students agreed that it was interesting to see things that were studied in class before the trip. The FDR Memorial was very popular. The 4 statues and 4 waterfalls of this memorial represented the 4 terms he served in office as President. Four terms?!? Presidents don't serve 4 terms! They only serve 2 terms. But, Franklin Roosevelt was different. He served 4 terms because the people of the country could not elect a new President during the Great Depression and World War II.

Some students also studied the Martin Luther King Memorial, which reads, "Out of a mountain of despair, a stone of hope." This statue symbolizes Dr. King's struggle. Two big pieces of granite represent the "mountain of despair," and the actual statue of MLK symbolizes the "stone of hope." It is 30-feet tall. I felt amazed at how big it is and what it means to the people who listened and respected his speeches.

The 5th graders were super excited to see the White House, because as Ella Jaffe said, "a lot of things happen there and it will give me a picture of what the President's family's

Middle School Madness

Are you thinking about middle school, yet? If you are, you shouldn't be worried at all! (Ok, maybe you should get a little excited.) Let's shed some light on the application process to help make it less of a mystery. Even if you are a 1st, 2nd or 3rd grader, you might want to pay attention. In a few years, you will go on the middle school journey, as well.

"The first step is that the 5th graders and their parents tour schools," said P.S. 11 Parent Coordinator, Stephen McGill. Signing up for some of those tours is as hard as getting a ticket for a popular rock concert, according to one mom. Another parent had some advice. "We had a group of moms working on this together. We all kept checking the websites for tour dates. When they were available,

we texted each other, signed up and toured together." This way, they did not miss anything and could talk about the schools and their experience afterward.

Regarding the tours, Mr. McGill

said, "It is hard because there is a lot of information that is given. You really need a parent who is listening for critical information. And then, you, as a student, have to try to get as much as possible out of the school tours." The tours take place in the fall. Soon after, you will receive the application with all of the schools listed and you have to select the ones you would like to go to in order of your preference. For P.S. 11, "return the application to Ms. Leonhardt in



December," stated Mr. McGill.

There is something 4th grade students and parents can do to prepare. You can go on the Department of Education website, which is www.schools.nyc.gov, and search for District 2 middle schools to find out what the middle schools are in our district. Go to their websites to take a look at them and do your homework. Some schools will ask you for an interview or to submit to a test.

Many parents advised to look for continued

schools that have a curriculum that is best suited for the child and that have a culture you like as a family. Also, if it is a very popular school with a rigorous selection process, be realistic about the chances to get in (How are your grades? Do you test well?). You want to list a school as your number one choice where you have a good chance to be admitted. In early or mid-April, you will be informed of the school to which you got in.

For 5th graders, going to middle school is a big change in their lives. Fifth grader, Isabelle, said, "I am very happy that I got into School of the Future. I really wanted to. I did the test at Lab school. It was hard. For example, in one part, it said, 'What does y x w = if it equals x?' And I thought to myself, 'What!?'" Isabelle got a tutor to help her prepare for the tests.

Sebastian, another 5th grader, said, "I was placed in Baruch and I like it. I was looking for a school that was 'techie' and for something bright and happy." Simon Baruch Middle School is the most common destination for P.S. 11 students, as it is our zoned middle school. That may change in 2017 with the introduction of a new local middle school, 75 Morton, Alex got into Baruch as well, "I was looking for a good recess yard, a nice building and good teachers. Baruch is my zoned school. I wanted to go there and was immediately accepted. I did not have to do a test."

Kenzo got into I.S. 289. For him, a good arts and science program and sports were important. All the kids said that they will miss P.S. 11 and their friends, but they are also looking forward to something new. "P.S. 11 is one of my favorite schools," said Kenzo. "I really love it here."

My favorite type of art is dance. I also got to work on a film with a



What Do You Think of Link?

LinkNYC is a project to provide free wi-fi and phone calls in New York City. The plan for this project was announced in November, 2014, by the Mayor's office. The plan is to replace around 7,500 pay phones with kiosks, also called Links. According to the website Link.NYC, the project is still in beta phase. "Beta phase" means it is still in testing.

Today, I went to test a Link installed near my apartment. There was free telephone service available on the Link provided by Vonage. I called my mom's phone to check the service. It was wonderful. Vonage is an Internet telephone service, providing free phone service anywhere in the U.S. at the Link kiosk. There is also a 911 button for emergencies. There is an application on the Link to access the 311 service.

I used the touchscreen tablet attached to the Link to browse the Internet. I checked Google Maps to find directions to my apartment. Then, I

played "The Final Countdown" song on YouTube.

The wi-fi is high speed and is called gigabit wi-fi. Gigabit wi-fi is 100 times faster than average public wi-fi or a cell phone's LTE network. The wi-fi is also secure and has a range of 150 feet. I could walk to another Link system without losing the wi-fi connection. There are also charging stations for your phone, which can be very helpful.

LinkNYC is being provided by the City of New York and CityBridge, a group of companies that are experts in technology and media. On the sides of the kiosks, there are 55-inch, high-definition, digital screens for public announcements and advertisements. I noticed a Delta airlines advertisement on the screen. A few minutes later, the car service Lyft had its advertisement show on the screen. LinkNYC is completely free for New Yorkers because it is funded through this advertising. It will generate more

than half a billion dollars in revenue.

In observing public usage of the units, it appeared that most users were men and many played music or charged their phones. A few people made publicly audible personal phone calls. Nobody knows how successful this program will be, but most importantly, it will connect the people of New York!

- If we treat our mothers well on just one day, we might forget to treat her well the other days.


