

Let's get ALL the students involved and take a vote to add a juice option to lunchtime at P.S. 11!



The Sad Truth About Puerto Rico

Puerto Rico was discovered on November 19, 1493 by Christopher Columbus on his second voyage to claim land for the rulers of Spain, King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella. In 1493, the island was called Borinquen by the natives who lived there. But Christopher Columbus renamed it San Juan Bautista.

In 1898, the United States defeated Spain in the Spanish-American War and claimed Puerto Rico as a U.S. territory. With that claim came responsibility. Many years later, President Wilson signed the Jones-Shafroth Act under which Puerto Rico officially became a U.S. territory. This also made the people of Puerto Rico U.S. citizens.

Puerto Rico is important to the United States because it helps our economy. The island exports a lot of useful things like rum, electronics, tuna, medical supplies, and chemicals to the mainland. And Puerto Rico is a popular tourist destination, which helps us because people who want to visit have to pay the U.S. a lot of money.

In September 2017, Puerto Rico was hit with a devastating hurricane that destroyed much of the island. Citizens were left without clean water and electricity. This was right after similar hurricanes caused much damage in Florida and Texas. It's important to know the history of Puerto Rico because, as part of the U.S., it is our responsibility to help them rebuild, just like when similar storms hit Florida and Texas.

The U.S. administration responded to the storms in Florida and Tex-

as by sending the U.S. army there to provide shelter, clean water, food and medical care to many citizens. They also helped many evacuate. But when it came to the storm in Puerto Rico, they took a long time to respond and when they did, there wasn't much that was done. This was completely unfair because Puerto Ricans are U.S. citizens just like people form Texas and Florida.

New York State Representative Nydia Velazquez said of the response to the disaster, "The most fundamental responsibility of the President of the U.S....is to show up and provide the assistance and the relief that American citizens need." She also said, "To kick fellow citizens while they

are down is shameful."

Carmen Yulin Cruz, Mayor of San Juan in Puerto Rico said, "Lives are at stake. This is not about politics. This is not about your ego. This is about the people of Puerto Rico."

People who have family in PR are very upset as well. Fifth-grader, Carmen Lacosta Kolsrud is scared, "because my aunt who lives there could die and she just had her baby." Of how the administration handled the situation, she said, "If you're going to help someone, you might as well help everyone. It's not fair to have your island taken over by some other president then ignored when you need the most help. Today, over half of the continued on next page

Puerto Rica continued page island is still without electricity and clean water. Many people have died or become ill."

Jana Juhasova, a spectator, said, "My fiancé is running the marathon, and I can't wait to see his smile."


The marathon is a big deal for
