- ① Attaining more participation in UU events such as the fall Valley Cluster Retreat at DeBenneville Pines, the spring District Assembly and the summer UUA General Assembly in Portland, Oregon, in 2015.
- Increasing the number of our members involved in the social justice activities that we support and participating in the UU Social Justice Ministry Cluster Project
- Actively working to add engaged congregation members through the development of a new program to educate potential members prior to their signing our membership book and having their induction
- Expanding activities as a Welcoming Congregation and continuing awareness-raising in this
 area for congregants
- ① Continuing to work with and supervise our part-time ministerial intern for the benefit of the congregation in numerous areas of ministry
- ① Focusing my efforts to accomplish these and other goals with your support

In our meeting of May 18, the SAC chose to lend more money on Kiva. Kiva makes it possible for us to assist in granting microloans to entrepreneurs, mainly in developing countries. We had only four available at the time, so we donated \$50 to each of them. This was possible because, at the suggestion of the church board, we took \$150 from the committee's budget to add to our Kiva budget.

Zaira is a seamstress in the country of Georgia. She has had trouble making ends meet in order to support her and her grandson, who is a student living with her. She will use the money loaned to her to purchase a heavy-duty sewing machine for stitching pillows and blankets, which will broaden her ability to make a good living.

One member of the Al-Bahr group, three ladies in Yemen who join forces to help each other, is borrowing to increase her stock of clothing to sell. Nada started her business a few years ago with a loan from Kiva and now is trying to improve that business to help support her children.






Oksana, of the Ukraine is also in the women's clothing business. She wants a more varied supply of goods to increase the business of the storefront she rents.

Here, I'll go first...

It was about a year ago that I met Lena at a salon. We had a surprising amount in common and developed a quick rapport. Our temperaments and personalities meshed well. She was brainy and witty and totally got my humor too. I have three children and she was pregnant with her third child. After a few get-togethers, I thought she could become one of those lifelong trusted girlfriends that we women want to connect with on a level that husbands and family often don't appreciate.

But, there is something about being near to pregnant women that makes us idiots! We pry and invade their personal space when they are at their most radiant and open. I remember it well from when I had kids. People could be so offensive! Why do complete strangers feel entitled to a woman's intimacies when she's expecting a child? Interlopers fumbled to touch my belly. Busybodies demanded answers about my conception. Meddlers imposed utterly flawed advice. I swore that I would never treat another woman that way; a gestating comrade; a soul sister!

Then, one weekend, the stupid fell out of *my* mouth! I shared with glowing Lena how I almost died giving birth to my last child. She cringed, "Don't freak me out like that." I was embarrassed and apologized. The conversation moved on.

But, *I* hadn't moved on. The betrayal and hurt I felt about my own birth experience had previously devolved into bitterness. My emotionally raw wound could still ooze to the surface even when I knew the timing was wrong. You just don't reveal sad stuff like that to someone when they need uplifting support. Lena's beauty reminded me of my inadequacies. I didn't call or email her and just kept on feeling mortified. The longer I hedged, the more I rationalized that she'd be relieved I was gone. Days turned into weeks and months to a year. I kept thinking about her and I missed her. I had spoiled a budding friendship. And, I couldn't bring myself to fix it.

Then, a few days ago, I received a magical gift of healing! Lena and I found each other in a parking lot; we clicked again. She had seen me around town a few times. I "looked busy". She didn't want to interrupt. When we did talk, my guilt washed away and I felt a clearing, a freeness, in being with my chum again. She missed me too. She had all but forgotten my comment. She didn't take it personally. She was more graceful about the endurances a woman must put up with than I. Her acceptance of my foibles; her nonjudgmental forgiveness helped me realize my own misplaced resentment.

Miracles come to us when we're ready to accept them. But, miracles happen every day -- we just won't notice until we're willing to receive them.
