And even though we were not rich, I could always count on my stocking being filled with nuts, candy, oranges, and a bottle of green olives with stuffed pimento centers – my unique treat – and some special gifts from Santa and my parents.

But when I entered high school, I became aware that all people didn't celebrate Christmas. Because there was a large number of Jewish students in my school, I found out about the celebration of Hanukkah. In many ways, those experiences provided me with some of the seeds for my later introduction into Unitarian Universalism – a gift that I continue to cherish.

But I find that some people in our country are trying to build fences around their religious beliefs and holidays and put down those who worship in a different way or do not worship at all. And I find that very sad. So I hope that during this holiday season, we UUs will find all the ways we can to embrace our commonalities and our differences and celebrate together with those of all faith traditions or none. And I wish for all a joyous Christmas, Hanukkah, Solstice, Yule, Kwanzaa, Chalica, and . . .!

ANOTHER BOOK DISCUSSION?

Being Mortal by Atul Gawande is a book I would like to discuss with other UU's. Currently, this book heads the NY Times Bestseller list for nonfiction, so we know that many other people are interested in the issues it raises.

The issue here is persuading Americans to deal more realistically with the conditions of old age, a very interesting stage of life which requires serious adjustments to the life style of its members, and also of the generation made up of their children, right now the historically populous group called "the baby boomers."

A practicing physician, Dr. Gawande has been writing books and articles that help the general public to understand medical issues since his senior year at Harvard. He is an engaging author, leading us into a discussion of larger issues by means of actual examples. He also footnotes his sweeping conclusions. Best of all, he is both honest and practical, presenting good models for readers' consideration.

What if we schedule for January two or three times when a group of people might get together to discuss this book? In the meantime, if you can lay hands on a copy, read it.

Celebrate Guest at Your Table!

Our Guest at Your Table program is going strong! So many families and friends have brought human rights home and welcomed our "guests" into their lives. Thanks to your support, the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee is working throughout the United States and around the world to advance human rights.

Your beautiful *Stories of Hope* booklet introduces you to people whose efforts in partnership with UUSC have helped change people's lives. Each week, with family and friends, we can focus on a different story of hope as we gather and consider our many blessings.

Meet Chrisantus Mwandihi, a Kenyan human rights defender who is working to address the impacts of climate change on his community's food supply and native forests. His work — developing food projects, setting up educational programs for children, and preserving and replanting native trees in the Kakamega Rain Forest — has been so successful that government agencies and local universities are now exploring it for models to replicate!

Meet Don Mario Pérez, who grows organic coffee beans using sustainable farming techniques. Through Equal Exchange, a fair-trade organization that UUSC works with, small farmers like Don Mario receive more secure and fair compensation for their products. When you buy those products through the UUSC Coffee Project, a portion of the proceeds goes into UUSC's Small Farmer Fund, which supports other human rights initiatives with UUSC partners. And we all enjoy the fruits of this labor!

Meet Nancy Vilce and Marie Obethe Moise, leaders of the Association for the Promotion of Integral Family Healthcare in Haiti who have organized the Art Oasis Café. They partner with community members by using produce from urban garden projects to prepare nutritious and affordable meals for city residents, and then use proceeds from the restaurant to support their work with youth. This collaboration strengthens community and can serve as a model for Guest at Your Table gatherings!

We will be collecting contribution envelopes at our Christmas Eve or December 28th service.



MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE



This is the point in time when our Search starts to get exciting! We've completed our research and compiled the information into an online Packet of essays and charts. Now, we have a chance to breathe a little bit while our UUCVH profile circulates through the UUA online match-making process.

Coming up soon... BCT! (What's that?)

BEYOND CATEGORICAL THINKING

THINK OF A MINISTER. DON'T THINK OF AN ELEPHANT.

"Basically, we're looking for an innovative pastor with a fresh vision who will inspire our church to remain exactly the same."

Chances are you thought of both. And distinct images perhaps came to mind. In terms of a minister, what images came to mind? Was it a person of a particular gender, race, or age?

Beyond Categorical Thinking is a highly recommended part of the search process for our congregation. In finding the person who would be the best match for our minister, we could potentially overlook or even let biases keep us from knowing that a particular person would be the best match for us.

Other congregations have assumed that their ideal minister looks a certain way, and often ministers who are not white or male or heterosexual or able-bodied or of a particular age or class are discounted and seen as "less than" in some ways.

Ministers in our faith who are people of color, bisexual, gay, lesbian, female, transgender, differently-abled, young, old, ethnically different, or of a different class—all of these credentialed ministers still face discrimination as part of the ministerial search process.

In our efforts to find the best match, UUCVH is planning to host a Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop.

We will have trainers come and facilitate a 2-3-hour conversation where we will have a chance to examine how we can avoid letting prejudice become a part of our search process. This is yet another way for us to put our faith into lived experience and improve the odds that regardless of identity, we will find the minister who is the best match for us and will serve us well. This opportunity allows the entire congregation fuller participation in the search process. It will allow us to explore our hopes and concerns for a new minister, learn more about the search process, and see how our own history (both personal and congregational) might interfere with our efforts in this search.

Plan to attend and participate in this BCT program provided by the UUA.
Schedule details will be announced as soon as possible – we're aiming for January, 2015.

The BCT program is now 20 years running and proves very useful and valuable to the congregations in the search process.
