### Camp de Benneville Pines

We've all been hearing about the "lake fire" recently in the mountains near our wonderful UU District Camp. Here's the latest update from our district camp manager Janet James


Today's report. (June 24, 2015)

Hello Camp Friends and Supporters:

Those of us who stayed behind in the evacuation have certainly seen a lot this past week, and we have watched men and women work so very hard to save structures and the wilderness. Hot shot teams from many western areas hike up into the wilderness behind our camp to fight the fire up on the peaks.

Last night one of the firefighters up on a peak was injured and had to be helivaced out. The parking lot had several emergency teams ready to hike up the mountain in case the extraction didn't go well. Thankfully, the extraction and transport in the dark and smokey sky was successful. The hot shots are up on a very treacherous part of the mountain behind the camp--well over 8000 or 9000 feet. I am amazed at what they do.

For several days these teams have been carving fire breaks in strategic areas to direct the fire purposefully in certain directions where the



fire can then be managed by airdrops or burn out naturally. At around 6 pm each day, team after team of charcoal-faced hot shots appear hiking out of the woods and through camp to the parking lot. They load on buses and are transported to Big Bear High School where they are fed and housed.

Camp dog, Daisy Doodle, has fallen in love with a USFS fire supervisor from Inyo County/Mt Whitney District. I can see why. He is a total dog lover...each night he appears with doggie treats and rough houses with her a bit. Last night Daisy and I were in the office, and she was asleep. All evening I could hear vehicles coming and going in the parking lot. But, I imagine she has a strong sense hearing, and when his vehicle pulled up in the parking lot, she made a dash to the door. She literally leapt into the arms of her favorite firefighter. But, as these things happen spontaneously, so too, they come to a quick end when lives are on the line. And this team was on standby to make certain that everything went correctly for the evacuation of the injured firefighter. I took Daisy back to the office where I worked at my desk til midnight, and she slept on the floor--possibly dreaming of bacon treats and her friendly firefighter.



Hwy 38 is still closed as I type this report at 3:30 pm. The official word is that we still have some hot spots and some dangerous areas they are working on. Public safety is number one for the USFS, and I have heard over and over again, "No tree is worth a human life." What a nice thing to hear, especially from people who protect our natural resources for a living. The cause of the fire has not been determined, and the investigation is ongoing. If you are familiar with the area to the west of our green water tank, and above our water tank, this is the area closest to camp where the fire burned. Then the flames raced up the mountain and to the east



from that point. We are so fortunate that the fire did not start down lower on the ridge and more west of us.

We still have few crews in camp who are pumping water up the mountain to the fire fighters, and teams of people who are going into the woods with shovels and picks to turn over trees and stumps to make sure the hot spots are out. You can imagine that this is a slow, difficult and dirty process.

We hope to have Camp Bravo Week 3 back in camp this Sunday, June 27; and with any luck, they will let the camp staff who evacuated off the mountain back to camp tomorrow, Thursday. They are thinking of



opening the hwy some time tomorrow. It will be nice to have the rest of the staff return.

We expect the PSWD camps to be operating fully starting July 5th with Elementary Camp. We continue to take registrations for our adult camps in August. And for those of you who have expressed dreams of coming back up to camp, I hope you will log onto our website, www.uucamp.org, and click on all the wonderful August events we have going on: Social Justice Family Camp, PSWIRL Farewell Camp, UU Choir Camp, and Art Groove all have outstanding programs, cater to adult interests, and available space. What a great way to support the camp in the aftermath of what has been a devastating loss on so many levels. Sign up for a summer camp adventure in August and help us fill the camp and support the business of camping!

I am not alone on the mountain top. The camp staff continue to watch over your beloved de Benneville Pines. Curtis, Steve, and Chris have remained here with me the entire time. Dan, Jackie, Reed and Niki were here part of the time. Oh yes, Daisy Doodle too. Your well wishes and prayers have meant a lot to us.
